Bias and Hate? Not On Our Campus!

Unfortunately, incidences of bias are still occurring in communities around the world including the SUNY Cortland community. We must continue, even in our so-called post-racial/post-hate world, to work diligently to combat such incidences. Bias hurts! Bias hurts the victim and bias hurts the perpetrator. Bias prevents us from being open minded and free to learn about what others bring to our community with their diversity.



In response, to a recent bias incident on campus, President Bitterbaum sent the following open letter to the campus.

To All Members of the SUNY Cortland Community,

SUNY Cortland is a campus that embraces diversity and appreciates the richness it brings to the intellectual culture. As a reminder, the College has a zero-tolerance policy regarding any and all forms of bias or discrimination. All allegations are fully investigated and subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Our nondiscrimination policy is based in federal and state law, including the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as Amended by the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972, and the New York State Human Rights Law.

The policy states:

Pursuant to State University of New York policy, SUNY Cortland is committed to fostering a diverse community of outstanding faculty, staff, and students, as well as ensuring equal educational opportunity, employment, and access to services, programs, and activities, without regard to an individual's race, color, national origin, religion, creed, age, disability, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, familial status, pregnancy, predisposing genetic characteristics, military status, domestic violence victim status, or criminal conviction.

SUNY Cortland is an institution of higher education. As such, we encourage all efforts to enhance teaching and learning, particularly regarding diversity and ways to eliminate prejudice and discrimination.

I am writing today to remind the SUNY Cortland Community that there is no "destination" in the work of equity and inclusion. There is only progress. This includes speaking up when we hear and see things that harm or exclude others, paying attention to our own impact on our cultural climate, and remembering to value what others bring to the table. During the Spring 2013 semester our campus governance leadership, along with our college President, articulated their commitment to diversity in the college *Statement on Diversity* which reads:

SUNY Cortland is dedicated to the premise that every individual is important in a unique way and contributes to the overall quality of the institution. We define diversity broadly to include all aspects of human difference. The College is committed to inclusion, equity, and access and thus committed to creating and sustaining a climate that is equitable, respectful and free from prejudice for students, faculty and staff.

We value diversity in the learning environment and know that it enhances our ability to inspire students to learn, lead and serve in a changing world. We are committed to promoting a diverse and inclusive campus through the recruitment and retention of faculty, staff and students. As a community, we hold important the democracy of ideas, tempered by a commitment to free speech and the standards of inquiry and debate. To this end, we are dedicated to developing and sustaining a learning environment where it is safe to explore our differences and celebrate the richness inherent in our pluralistic society. It is my hope that during the Spring 2014 semester we come together as a community and live, lead, and serve with this commitment central in our daily lives. I look forward to our continuing progress as a community. Thank you for what you do to make SUNY Cortland a leader in Academic and Inclusive Excellence.

At 3:00 pm Sunday, December 8, 2013, several people gathered inside of the Interfaith Center to commemorate a legend. Nelson Mandela died December 5, after suffering from a prolonged respiratory infection. The world had been watching and waiting in angst when reports began to generate that Mandela was ill and had been taken to a hospital.

Mandela became South Africa's first black president after serving over 27 years in prison. Advocacy, activism, and social justice seemed to be a matter of common sense to him and he believed that the purpose of this work was important to us all because he posited that freeing others from oppression ensured your own freedom. This sentiment became evident in the following quote:

"For to be free is not merely to cast off one's chains, but to live in a way that respects and enhances the freedom of others."

- Nelson Mandela

During the tribute service at the Interfaith Center several individuals shared remarks to help those in attendance understand the importance of Mandela's legacy and later the attendees were asked to make a pledge in honor of Mandela's life. Eighteen pledges were submitted and though diverse, they all carried the themes of continuing to love others, working harder for inclusivity, respecting difference, promoting peace, having courage to speak up and speak out against injustices and to live with confidence that one person can make a big difference.

Reverend Vicki Johnson of Campus Ministry of SUNY Cortland for coordinated this event. The event gave the SUNY Cortland community to join together to mourn an icon who was important to our history and to our future in learning to speak up and speak out against social injustices that continue to prevent community, growth, and global citizenship. 

Planning is underway for the annual student conference on diversity, equity, and social justice. The conference will take place on Saturday, April 12, 2014. A


conference schedule and announcement of the keynote speaker will be posted as we begin to get closer to the conference date.

Professors Publish New Article on Diversity

Profs. Mecke Nagel and Seth N. Asumah just published their article "Diversity Studies and Managing Differences – Unpacking SUNY Cortland's Case and National Trends" in an anthology *Sprache - Macht – Rassismus* (Language-Power-Racism), edited by G. Hentges, K. Nottbohm, M. M. Jansen, J. Adamou, with Metropol Verlag, Germany. The authors trace the origins of



multiculturalism and diversity education at SUNY Cortland and how national trends on diversity and social justice have shaped Cortland's endeavors. Furthermore, they introduce the three-day Summer Diversity Institute as a way of training faculty and staff at the university level.

Several essays of the volume were presented earlier at a symposium on Critical Race Theory in the Academy, May 2013, where Prof. Nagel gave an invited talk on comparative perspective on Cortland's and Fulda University's diversity education and diversity practices. Prof. Nagel has taught at Fulda for the past six years.

MLDO Director Update

Noelle Chaddock Paley, Chair of the University Faculty Senate Committee on Diversity and Cultural Competence, addressed the University Faculty Senate on January 24, 2014. Paley and other committee members encouraged senators and campus governance leaders from all 64 SUNY Campuses to use the "Making Diversity Count" document to help lead their governance bodies in supporting diversity on their campuses.
