Best of SUNY Art Exhibition to Include Work of Three SUNY Cortland Students

The work of three SUNY Cortland student artists has been selected for the Best of SUNY Student Art Exhibition on display until Sept. 24 in the hallways of State University Plaza in Albany.

Located in the historic former D&H Railway Building in downtown Albany, the exhibition is free and open to the public and includes works of art by 63 students representing 25 SUNY campuses.

The three SUNY Cortland seniors whose art was chosen for the exhibition are: Shannon Glossl, a new media design major from Vestal, N.Y., Suzanne E. Hickok, a studio art major from Binghamton, N.Y., and Scott Oldfield, a studio art major from Victor, N.Y.

The Best of SUNY Student Art Exhibition is the third in a year-long

series of shows presenting the work of SUNY students from throughout the system. The first two exhibits were held last fall and earlier this year. The Best of SUNY Student Art Exhibition features works selected from the first two shows.

"New York State has long been recognized as a leader in our country for its support of the arts," said SUNY Chancellor Robert King. "SUNY's campuses continue that leadership through their education of art students in art departments all across the state. These shows are a culmination of these investments."

"The traditional areas of drawing, painting, photography, printmaking and sculpture make up the majority of the works in this exhibit; yet several pieces created using non-traditional methods

are on view. The result is an exhibition with a wide-range of visual diversity," said Joe Hildreth, distinguished service professor of art at the State University College at Potsdam and exhibit organizer.

Concurrent with the student exhibitions, the work of SUNY's art faculty is being presented at State University Plaza in a series of smaller, single-campus exhibits. To date, exhibits have been presented featuring work by faculty from the colleges at Cortland, Geneseo, Oswego, Plattsburgh, Potsdam and Purchase, the Fashion Institute of Technology and Dutchess and Monroe Community Colleges .

Residence Hall Groundbreaking Set for July 13

SUNY Cortland will formally break ground on its first new residence hall in 30 years during a ceremony on Tuesday, July 13.

The \$11 million facility will be located south of Neubig Hall on the site of the current Bishop Hall and Shea Hall annexes. The groundbreaking ceremony begins at 9:30 a.m. and is open to the public. An invitation-only reception will follow at 10 a.m. in the Neubig Hall cafeteria.

President Erik J. Bitterbaum will preside over the formal program which

will include local elected officials, representatives from the architectural and construction firms working on the new building, and officials from both the SUNY Construction Fund and the College.

The four-storied residence hall will feature a colored glass tower that will face Corey Union and 195 beds in its junior style suites with private baths. Recent renovations to existing SUNY Cortland residence halls have resulted in a decreased capacity on campus. These refurbished facilities feature larger double

rooms and more single rooms, necessitating the new residence hall to meet student on-campus living needs.

Construction will commence with the demolition of both annexes. Students will occupy the new facility at the start of the Fall 2005 semester.

The first day of classes for Summer Session II is Monday, June 28. Classes begin at 8 a.m.

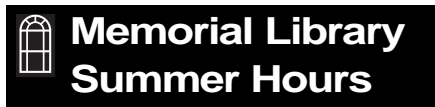
Walk-in Registration and Drop/Add

Cortland Athletic Program Places Eighth in National Directors' Cup Division III Competition

The SUNY Cortland men's and women's inter-collegiate athletic program finished eighth in the 2003-04 United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition among the 430 eligible NCAA Division III programs competing nationally for the honor. The award, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), was formerly known as the Sears Directors' Cup from 1995-2002 and the NACDA Directors' Cup in the 2002-03 school year.

Cortland is one of only six schools nationwide, and the only New York institution, to place in the top 20 each of the nine years the standings have been compiled on a Division III level. The Red Dragons were 15th last season, 12th in 2001-02, 13th in 2000-01, 17th in 1999-2000, eighth in both 1998-99 and 1996-97, tied for second in 1997-98 and 19th in 1995-96.

Cortland had 13 teams participate in NCAA post-season competition this season. Six Red Dragon teams finished in the top 10, and 10 were in the top 20. The field hockey team tied for third in the country, the men's lacrosse team tied for fifth and the softball team tied for seventh. Both the volleyball and women's lacrosse teams tied for ninth and wrestling finished 10th. Baseball, men's soccer and women's basketball each tied for 17th and the men's outdoor track and field team tied for 18th.

In addition, the women's gymnastics team finished fourth at the National Collegiate Gymnastics Association Division III championships, although that finish is not included in the Directors' Cup scoring system.

The standings are compiled based on schools' national finishes in different sports. Teams that qualify for the post season receive a minimum of 25 points (in most sports) and earn additional points for advancing in the playoffs. The national champion in each sport receives 100 points. Cortland finished with 627.5 points.

Developed as a joint effort between *USA Today* and NACDA, there are four Directors' Cup Awards, one to honor overall champions in each of the NCAA's Divisions (I, II and III) and the NAIA. It is the first-ever cross-sectional all sports national recognition award for both men and women. Williams College of Massachusetts won its sixth straight Division III competition this season.

NACDA, which is now in its 39th year, is the professional and educational association for more than 6,100 college athletics directors, associates, assistants and conference commissioners at more than 1,600 institutions throughout the United States, Mexico and Canada.
