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Joy Hendrick Named Distinguished Service Professor

The SUNY Board of Trustees promoted Joy L. Hendrick, kinesiology, to the rank of Distinguished Service Professor during its May 12 meeting in Fort Schuyler, N.Y.

The 'distinguished' rank, which only can be conferred by the SUNY Board of Trustees on the recommendation of the campus, System Administration and SUNY chancellor, constitutes a promotion above that of full professor.

Hendrick, as a distinguished service professor, is honored and recognized for her substantial extraordinary service not only at the campus and within SUNY, but also at the community, regional, state and national levels.

"The genius of SUNY faculty lies not only in their intellectual capacity, but also in their surpassing excellence in teaching and in their ability to apply their scholarship and research

in service to the campus and larger community in which we all live," said SUNY Board of Trustees Chairman Carl T. Hayden. "These SUNY faculty attract students and scholars to our campuses, enhance the prestige of the entire university, and they are most deserving of the highest academic rank the university can bestow."

Hendrick, who has served the College for 25 years, coordinates the Exercise Science Unit. She directs the Motor Behavior Lab, teaches graduate and undergraduate courses within the exercise science area, serves as statistical consultant for all master's theses projects and many of the undergraduate research projects, advises more than 40 students each semester, conducts research and serves as a research mentor for undergraduate students.

College to Honor Three Alumni at July Reunion

The SUNY Cortland Alumni Association will present its highest honor, the Distinguished Alumna/Alumnus Award, to three graduates during the Alumni Reunion Weekend luncheon in Corey Union on Saturday, July 18.

The 2009 Distinguished Alumni Award recipients are Rosa LaSorte Rich '55, who is being honored for her outstanding service in public secondary and higher education, and the late retired Cmdr. John W. Clark '59, a highly decorated U.S. Navy officer whose 31-year career included combat service during the Vietnam War. The association will bestow its Distinguished Young Alumni Award on Jené Lupoli Luciani '99, a successful broadcast journalist who chronicles the fashion industry.

Since 1968, 107 SUNY Cortland graduates, including this year's honorees, have received the Distinguished Alumni Award for their career accomplishments and outstanding service to their community and alma mater. In addition, 18 alumni have been recognized with Distinguished Young Alumni awards and six have been named Honorary Alumni.

New Chancellor's Award Recognizes Peg Waltman

Margaret "Peg" Waltman, a keyboard specialist in the Registrar's Office, has been honored with the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Classified Staff.

She received the prestigious award during the 2009 Undergraduate Commencement on Saturday, May 16, in the Park Center.

The award was newly created by SUNY this year and Waltman becomes the first SUNY Cortland recipient.

She is recognized for superior performance and extraordinary achievement in classified service. Nominees were considered based on their job performance in their present position, their flexibility and creativity on campus, and their demonstration of exemplary customer service. The award demonstrates SUNY's acknowledgement of individuals who provide superior service to students and the community at large.

The Chancellor's Award process begins at each of the 64 SUNY campuses with nominations submitted by the respective presidents. The SUNY Committee on Awards then reviews the nominations and makes its recommendations.

Waltman has served SUNY Cortland for 21 years as the undergraduate degree clerk.

"It is quite an honor to be one of the first recipients of the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Classified Service, especially in representing SUNY Cortland in the inaugural year of the award," said Waltman. "It has been so rewarding over the years to see the successful degree accomplishments of our many students, and knowing that I may have played a small part in their success in earning their degree. Additionally, having the opportunity to work with the dedicated faculty and staff has been a sincere pleasure."

Pierre Gagnon Named ASC Executive Director

Pierre R. Gagnon of Clayton, N.Y., will serve as executive director of the Auxiliary Services Corporation (ASC), the organization announced on May 11.

Gagnon, who currently serves as executive director of the Faculty Student Association of Jefferson Community College, begins his duties on June 29. He replaces Dana Wavle, who left in January after 13 years of service to the College community to become the vice chancellor of administration and finance at Indiana University Southeast. Michelle K. Brackin, who currently serves as the interim executive director of ASC, will be the assistant to the executive director.

Founded more than 50 years ago, ASC is a campus-based, not-for-profit organization providing dining services, vending, campus stores, student ID cards and other essential services to the campus community. ASC strives to promote the quality of student life and support the educational goals and mission of the College.

The organization employs approximately 425 full- and part-time workers, including many students, and is the largest employer of students on campus. A board of directors composed of students, faculty and administrators governs the corporation.

Gagnon's responsibilities will include organizing, evaluating and directing the ASC business affairs, including administrative, fiscal, operational, long-range planning and personnel management.

Gagnon has served Jefferson Community College since 1994. He is chief executive officer overseeing all aspects of operation and management of the private, not-for-profit Faculty Student Association, which provides auxiliary services to Jefferson Community College. In that position, he is responsible for the bookstore, food service, day care and campus debit card administration.

In 2007, she was pivotal in the success of Cortland's new General Education Program. Waltman also spearheaded the development and execution of TEACH, an online process Cortland students use to apply for teacher certification to the New York State Education Department (NYSED).

"As her supervisor, I have greatly enjoyed my working relationship with Peg," wrote Registrar Donna Margine, who joined the College in 1995. "She is the consummate professional, working in a position that involves every Cortland student, faculty, advisor and administrator. She has a genuine concern for the academic success of our students. She has taken great pride in enhancing Cortland's academic reputation when you consider the commitment she has made over the years and the significant

changes she has endured as a result of emerging technologies."

In 1999, Waltman participated in the strategic planning for the College's conversion to the Banner Student Records System. She was an instrumental participant in the development and implementation of the Curriculum Advising and Program Planning (CAPP), Banner's degree audit and assisted in the planning for online registration. Waltman was a key architect for developing online CAPP accessibility. She also was a major player in the employment of the online degree and the diploma and commencement application.

A native of Williamsport, Pa., Waltman and her husband, Franklin Waltman, international communications and culture emeritus, live in Cortland.
