Why Teach Abroad?

- Approximately 1.7 billion people are learning and using English worldwide (British Council 2015)
- An estimated 250,000 native English speakers work abroad as English teachers in more than 40,000 schools and language institutes.
- More than 100,000 positions abroad for English teachers open each year.

What is a Foreign Service Officer?


- □ Foreign Service Officers (Generalists) and Foreign Service Specialists promote U.S. interests and protect U.S. citizens at U.S. embassies and consulate posts overseas and in Washington, D.C.
- Foreign Service Workers work in five broad career tracks
- Foreign Service Specialists perform a variety of technical functions worldwide
- Most of the Foreign Service career is spent overseas
- Worldwide availability is a requirement
