## CORTLAND ALUMNUS: Principal's School Wins National Honor

Chris Harper, a graduate of the Cortland Mohawk Valley Graduate Center, is currently the principal of Westmoreland Road Elementary School. On October 2nd, the school celebrated being named a *2007 No Child Left Behind Blue Ribbon School* by the U.S. Department of Education.

The national honor rewards public schools that meet either of two criteria: 40% of the students come from disadvantaged backgrounds that dramatically improve student performance

on state assessments, or the school scores in the top 10% on state assessments.

"The success of the students of this school is attributed to the teamwork I see daily," Chris Harper said during an afternoon assembly. "You all work together to make Westmoreland Road School what it is today."

The school was chosen for the federal honor because students met yearly academic improvement goals for five years. It is one of 16 schools in the state, and one of nearly 300 in the country to receive the designation.

# POTENTIAL GRADS: It's Time to Apply to Graduate!



If you are a graduate student who has earned 18 or more credit hours and you plan to complete all your degree requirements by December 2008, you are eligible to apply on-line to graduate. In fact, **you must officially apply to graduate** in order to receive your degree and diploma. It is very easy to apply to graduate on the SUNY Cortland BannerWeb system. All you need to do is log onto Bannerweb using your Cortland ID number and select “Academic Services/Registrar” from the menu. Then click on “Graduation and Commencement Menu” then “Degree and Diploma Application.” After this, you just follow the on-screen instructions and complete the information that is requested.

The last page of this application process will confirm that you have successfully APPLIED for your degree and diploma. You can not actually receive a degree or diploma until ALL requirements are completed, including student teaching, internships, fieldwork and comprehensive exams. You must also make up any incomplete grades. For example, if you have an incomplete grade from Spring Semester and complete your coursework in July, then your degree date will be August. You will receive your diploma and free transcript approximately two months after your degree date.

All students who complete their degree requirements by December 2008 are eligible to participate in the May 2008 commencement ceremony. Diplomas, however, are not handed out at the ceremony, but will be mailed to you.
