Immerse yourself in the language and culture of France. Develop oral and written skills that, combined with preparation in related disciplines, lead to an international perspective, global awareness as well as a wide variety of career options.

Career Potential

- Business: International trade, bilingual consultant, translator, customer support agent
- Government: Diplomacy, FBI, National Security Agency, Border Patrol, immigration agencies, government or court translator
- Writing: Newspapers, trade publications, book publishers, bilingual translator for websites, proofreader, writer, editor
- > Tourism and hospitality: Interpreter, guide, bilingual travel agent, study abroad coordinator or director
- Education: Teaching in private schools or in private sector, pursue masters and/or doctorate to become a college professor

By choosing many of your classes through elective courses, you can tailor your program to your specific interests.

Applying to Cortland

- SUNY Cortland accepts the Common Application and the SUNY Online <u>application</u>. Choose just one way to apply; both require a \$50 non-refundable application fee.
- If you apply to Cortland using the SUNY application, SUNY will waive the \$50 application fee for transfer students graduating with an associate degree from a SUNY or CUNY college, who apply directly to Cortland for baccalaureate programs.
- Fall applicants should apply by March 1. Spring applications should apply by November 1.
- After applying, students must send transcripts from all colleges attended and a high school transcript.
