### GE 11: Prejudice and Discrimination

The goal of this category is for students to reflect critically about causes and consequences of prejudice and discrimination from individual to institutional levels. Courses in the category examine the challenges of constructing a more diverse and inclusive society.

#### Learning Outcomes

Students will demonstrate an understanding of:

1. how power, bias, prejudice, and discrimination can affect society's values, attitudes, and institutions;
2. strategies that address barriers and lead to greater equity and inclusivity.
