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I. Introduction

We are pleased to present the 2022-23 Annual Report for the School of Arts and Sciences. We were excited to welcome sixteen new faculty colleagues last year, including thirteen assistant professors and three full time lecturers. However, maintaining a full complement of faculty continues to be challenging, as by the end of the year, fifteen faculty members either fully retired or started phased retirement, and another six submitted their resignations.

Several Arts & Sciences faculty, staff, students, and alumni received significant honors in the last year. Kathleen Burke, Economics, was promoted to the rank of Distinguished Teaching Professor. Three colleagues received 2023 SUNY Chancellor's Awards: Teagan (Tyler) Bradway, for Excellence in Scholarship and Creative Activities, Jenn McNamara, Art & Art History, for Excellence in Faculty Service, and Lori Foster, English, for Excellence in Classified Service. Mecke Nagel, Philosophy, received the Dr. Peter Di Nardo '68 and Judith Waring Outstanding Achievement in Research Award. Two Arts & Sciences students received Chancellor's Awards: Lawrence Bruce '22 (English) and Daniel Reischer '22 (Political Science). Mary Cannito-Coville, Sociology/Anthropology, won the 2023 Tenure Track Excellence in Teaching Award, and her department colleague Elizabeth Bittel received the Excellence in Academic Advising Award. Eight Arts & Sciences graduates received awards at the 2023 Alumni Reunion. You may read about the many other impressive achievements of our faculty, students and alumni in the pages ahead.

II. Assessment and Student Learning Outcomes

This is the fifth year of reviewing SLO reports and providing feedback to departments. Two departments did not submit assessment data for 2022-23. Of the 17 reports that were submitted, 7 were determined to be excellent, another 7 were acceptable, and the remaining 3 were developing.

Highlights of program or curricular changes based on SLO assessment included the following:

- The Biological Sciences department is planning a new 3-course core curriculum based on previous assessment data.
- The English department is discussing how AI may impact their assessment of student outcomes.
- The SLOs for the Mathematics department have been newly revised and all were assessed this year.
- Physics is planning to shift all their courses up by one semester which will require that incoming first year students take a physics course in their first semester.

Ten academic departments were engaged in some aspect of program review in 2022-23. Four departments (Art & Art History, Geography, Geology, Mathematics) submitted their final reports and met with the dean to discuss the results and next steps. Another four programs (Chemistry, International Studies, Philosophy, Political Science) held visits with external reviewers in spring 2023 and will complete the process in the fall. Two departments (Biological Sciences and Sociology/Criminology) completed their self study documents and will host their external reviewers in fall 2023. Two departments (Performing Arts and Psychology) were scheduled for program review but reported little progress. These reviews will need to be completed next year. Two new program reviews are scheduled for 2023-24: Economics and Anthropology/Archaeology.

The Associate Dean's Office compiled data regarding student academic standing from 2021-22, summarizing it in the three tables found in Appendix 1.

III. Enrollment Trends and Budget Analysis

A review of the data provided by the Office of Institutional Research and Assessment reveals that enrollments in Arts and Sciences programs have continued on a downward trend since 2018. Key statistics of interest include the following:

- The total enrollment in Arts and Sciences programs (both undergraduate and graduate, including both first and second majors) went from 2992 in fall 2018 to 2505 in fall 2022. a decrease of 16%. The overall enrollment at Cortland decreased by about 3% (7000 to 6778) over the same time.
- The largest decreases in the last five years occurred in Sociology/Anthropology (427 to 308), Biological Sciences (365 to 268), and Communication & Media Studies (318 to 237).
- Four departments saw their enrollments increase between 2018 and 2022: Economics (458 to 461), Geography (17 to 22), History (218 to 243) and Psychology (316 to 352).
- At the graduate level, two programs saw significant increases in the last year resulting from their move to fully online delivery. The MA in History went from 5 students in fall 2021 to 18 students in fall 2022. The MSED in TESOL increased from 11 to 35 students. Both programs are expecting continued growth in 2023.

Budget analysis

In 2022-23, travel expenditures in Arts & Sciences returned to pre-pandemic levels. The Dean's Office spent just over \$90,000 to support faculty travel, including \$49,932 from state funding (representing 73% of the dean's office OTPS budget allocation) and another \$40,133 from Research Foundation funds. We also provided \$2,700 in RF funds to support faculty development (journal subscriptions and/or professional society memberships).

The total OTPS allocation for the School of Arts and Sciences was reduced by 13%, from \$375,633 in 2021-22 to \$327,217 in 2022-23. We stayed within this reduced budget, spending just under \$314,000, or 96% of the allocation. However, several chairs reported that their budgets are under increased strain due to rising costs of supplies and materials, including consumables for science labs, art supplies, and software licensing fees. Other chairs reported that it was challenging to support costs associated with faculty searches from their OTPS budget. Departments can rarely afford to cover the cost of replacing or repairing equipment, and they continue to rely on opportunities to apply for capital equipment and academic equipment funding to meet critical needs.

The A&S temp service expenditures increased slightly, from \$2.21M in 2021-22 to \$2.30M in 2022-23, still less than the \$2.37M spent in 2019-20. Managing the temp service budget will be an increasing challenge moving forward, with the significant increases in adjunct salaries that are projected as part of the new collective bargaining agreement.

Two Arts & Sciences students received the 2023 Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence:

- Lawrence Bruce '22 (English): Bruce was a Summer Undergraduate Research Fellow in 2022 and presented his work at two professional conferences in 2023. He held several leadership positions on campus, including treasurer of the Cortland Writer's Association and the Interfaith Crew, project leader for NYPIRG's Hunger and Homelessness Project and as membership chair of the Cortland NAACP chapter. As president of Pride Club and at-large senator for Student Government Association, Bruce created new events including Gay Cabaret and Homecoming and led trips to New York City's Stonewall Inn, the birthplace of the Gay Rights movement and to Cortland's William H. Parks Family Center for Environmental and Outdoor Education facility at Raquette Lake. Bruce has received an LGBTQIAP+ Advocacy Award from SGA and was recognized with a Leadership in Civic Engagement Award.
- Daniel Reischer '22 (Political Science): Reischer served the Student Government Association as chief of staff (2020) and vice president (2021) and strove to represent all students by pushing the

creation of wellness days during the Spring 2021 Semester. He built bridges between SGA leadership and cultural organizations, worked to expand safe housing for LGBTQ+ students and organized a mutual aid drive to collect clothing, bedding and cookware for individuals in need. Reischer committed much of his time as an undergraduate to research that set him apart from his peers. He wrote a policy brief on "Righting the Wrongs of Incarceration in New York State Prisons." His paper, "The Rise of Right-Wing Radio in the United States," received first place awards in national essay contest sponsored by the National Council for Black Studies and in the annual SUNY Cortland Writing Contest.

F. Department Highlights in Teaching, Research and Creative Activity

Arts and Sciences faculty continued to be active teachers and scholars who also contributed significant service to their departments, the college, and the profession. Comprehensive lists of faculty achievements are found in Appendix 2 (Publications and Creative Activities), Appendix 3 (Presentations) and Appendix 4 (External Grants.) We are pleased to present the following highlights from the preceding year. Space limitations did not allow us to include many other examples that may be found in the individual department reports.

Africana Studies

- Michael Tillotson was named acting department chair in January 2023. Dr. Tillotson received
 continuing appointment and promotion to the rank of professor, both of which will be effective
 on September 1, 2023. He published a new article in the Journal of Black Studies and continues to
 appear as a recurring panelist on the Ivory Tower, a weekly program airing on Syracuse PBS affiliate
 WCNY.
- Dr. Tillotson received the highest honor in Africana Studies, the Fannie Lou Hammer Kwame Nkrumah Award for Service and Leadership from the National Council for Black Studies.
- Dr. Tillotson was also nominated for the 2022-23 Outstanding Achievement in Mentoring Undergraduate Research Award.
- Cortland graduates Kenyonna White and Daniel Reischer were both accepted for graduate studies in African American Studies at Indiana University. Kenyonna also received an honorable mention at the 2023 Writing Gala sponsored by the College Writing Committee.
- In fall 2022, the department had 3 majors and 6 minors. In spring 2023, those numbers increased to 4 majors and 9 minors. We are expecting to see additional growth in the coming year.
- The Africana Studies Department sponsors three performing ensembles. The African American Chorale welcomed a new director, Danielle Mitchell. The Rock, Jazz, and Blues ensemble, led by full time lecturer Richard Harris, performed at the Service Awards luncheon in December 2022 and the SUNY Cortland Works event in May 2023. Dr. Yomee Lee continues to lead the Africana Dance ensemble.

Art & Art History

The department hired long-time adjunct Bryan Thomas as a full time lecturer in January 2023. Bryan taught ATS 314 Figure Drawing I with great success. Students were enthusiastic to see this course offered after not being taught for many years.

Professor Martine Barnaby joined the Computer Applications Program Advisory Committee. She identified several ATS courses that could also serve the CAP program by cross-listing them across both programs.

Adjunct positions this year were held by Scott Oldfield (Foundations, Fall/Spring), Jacob Damm (Art History, Fall), and Nicole Wagner (Art History, Fall/Spring).

The department had two retirements and one resignation.

- Professor Jeremiah Donavan (Ceramics) completed his final semester in Spring 2023. Professor Donavan will continue his studio work as Emeritus faculty and will also continue his long involvement with study abroad programs.
- Professor Charles Heasley (GDDM) will start phased retirement in fall 2023.
- In June, Professor Szilvia Kadas (GDDM) submitted her resignation.

The Raquette Lake experience courses ATT 155 and ATT 415 had successful in-person attendance headed by Professor Vaughn Randall.

Art historian Dr. Wylie Schwartz completed her first year of teaching in her tenured position as a strong addition to the department with her contribution to curriculum, new course development, student field trips, and advising (not required in the first year) BFA committees.

Professor Jenn McNamara was awarded the prestigious Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Faculty Service (May 2023). She continues as director of the honors program and served on many college-wide committees, including the Institutional Planning and Assessment Committee, Honors Program Advisory Council, Middle States Steering, and co-chaired the General Education Committee.

New initiatives

The department curriculum committee is completing revisions of all department majors [ART_ARTH], [ART_ARTS], [BFA_BFAS], and minors [ARTH], [ARTS], and [GDDM]. The curriculum committee expects to submit program alterations in fall 2023.

Professor Clark and Professor Barnaby organized participation at the New York State Art Teachers Association (NYSATA) Conference in November 2022, Binghamton, NY. Professor Scott Oldfield attended both days. Several conference attendees were art department alumni in teaching positions state-wide. Our involvement has produced very positive responses from NYS art teachers who can help to promote our department to prospective students. The next steps in the coming year for the recruitment committee are to plan follow-up visits at regional high school art programs, work with admissions to strengthen our recruiting efforts and develop leave-behind promotional materials.

In the fall of 2022, the department sponsored a data retreat at the Alumni House, and conducted a second round of SLO assessment in several 300 and 400 level courses in spring 2023.

The Dowd Gallery had a successful year, led by director Jaroslava Prihodova, including:

- · 11 Axillary and satellite exhibitions presented at various locations on campus
- 7 Virtual Events/Programs
- · 8 Collaborations and hosted events
- · 38 In-person Events
- · 6 Educational presentations for students and teachers

Scott Oldfield continued as a part-time assistant in the preparator position.

Stephen Clark Facilitated and taught the study abroad program in Dingle Ireland (summer session 2023). He made SAB presentations about this program at SUNY Potsdam and SUNY Plattsburgh.

Publications/ Creative Activities/Exhibitions

- Jerimiah Donovan presented a Maya pottery workshop in San Antonio, TX, and facilitated an art educators' workshop in Cortland, NY.
- Stephen Clark was accepted into the Orein Arts Residency program in Elmira NY for summer 2023. He completed a commissioned portrait of Abraham Lincoln DeMond as part of SUNY Cortland's observance of Black History Month in February 2023. He was published in an Exhibition catalogue for a group exhibition, The Wood for the Trees, at Hawk and Hive Gallery.
- Vaughn Randall exhibited his work at Fer Precieux in Wroclaw Poland and at an outdoor sculpture exhibition at SUNY Oswego. He completed a sculpture commissioned by the city of Pittston, PA.
- Wylie Schwartz made six conference presentations and had a 25-page journal article published by Oxford Press, UK.

Service

Ten faculty engaged in 87 service activities. 82 Institutional, 2 Regional, 2 State and 1 local community.

Biological Sciences

Curriculum:

Two faculty developed and taught new majors-level courses during the academic year, Dr. Christa Chatfield – Microbial Pathogenesis in the fall of 2022 and Careers and Community in STEM in the spring of 2023, and Dr. Jesse Bateman - Soil Biology in the spring of 2023. All the faculty in the department have been involved in discussions related to major curricular changes within our core set of courses.

Publications:

Several faculty published work in peer-reviewed journals during 2022-23. Dr. Dávalos published invasive species/conservation biology research in the journal *Ecology* and (with one of her students as lead author) in the journal *Biosphere*. She also published in *The Conservationist* and a book chapter in *Sustainable Management of Invasive Species (in press)*. Dr. Bloom Bateman and collaborators published a manuscript describing paleoclimate changes in the Pacific northwest in the journal *Paleoceanography and Paleoclimatology* in Jan 2023. Dr. Curtis published a manuscript on olfactory receptor signaling in the journal *Physiology* in May 2023 with students as two of the co-authors. In addition, she and her students as three of the co-authors published a second manuscript in April 2023 in the journal *Biosensors*. Dr. Davis and her collaborator published in two conference proceedings (Oct 2022, Cornell Nutrition Conference and Feb 2023, Southwest Nutrition Conference). Seven faculty have 11 papers in preparation or submitted for review at this time including several with student co-authors.

Presentations at Regional/National/International Conferences

A number of faculty in the Biological Sciences presented at conferences during 2022-23. Dr. Banerjee at DBNY in Nov 2022, Dr. Bateman at Cal State at Fullerton Geology Dept as part of their Fall 2022 seminar series, and at the American Geophysical Union Fall 2022 meeting in Chicago, IL in Dec. 2022, Dr. Curtis at the American Physiology Summit in April 2023, Dr. Davalos at Colgate University as part of their Biology Seminar Series in Nov 2022, in NYC in Dec 2022 at the Department of Environmental Protection, and at SACNAS Cornell in 2022, Dr. Davis in Oct 2022 at the Cornell Nutrition Conference, Dr. Ducey at the NYS

Master Teachers Workshop in June 2022 and as an invited speaker at Appalachian State University in Sept 2022 and at the NYS Invasive Species Network Conference also in Sept 2022, Dr. McCarthy, two different presentations at Botany 2022 in July 2022, an invited speaker at the University of New Brunswick seminar series in Feb 2023 and at the Polyploidy 2023 conference in May 2023.

Grants (funded):

Faculty Research Program grants were awarded during this time period to Drs. Bateman, Eierman, and McCarthy to support their research programs. Several faculty have new or ongoing external grant funding including Conklin (Co-PI, NSF grant, LSAMP Alliance, \$1,990,000), Dávalos and Eierman (Co-PIs, NYDEC grant, \$94,811 and also NYSDOT grant, \$15,000), Dávalos (Co-PI, NE State Research Cooperative grant), Davis (Co-PI, NSF grant, \$1,021,609), Eierman (Cary Institute of Ecosystem Studies to support research student in department), and Banerjee (travel award to attend Neurobiology 2023 conference), McCarthy (travel awards to attend the Botanical Society of America 2022 conference and the Botany 2023 conference, and travel awards for two of their students to attend Botany 2023). Davalos and Voltura along with Dr Li Jin in Geology at SUNY Cortland, and Dr. N. Sard in Biology at SUNY Oswego were awarded a \$634,546 grant (eligible to be extended annually through five years) from the USGS. Much of the research will be conducted at the USGS Great Lake Science Center's Tunison Lake Ontario Biological Station. Funding from this grant will support research on the restoration of specific native fish species to Lake Ontario and will fund several summer research students from both SUNY Institutions. Although not a funded grant, Conklin submitted a successful application for inclusion of SUNY Cortland as a University Partner in the Great Lakes Northern Forest Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Unit (GL-NF CESU) which then led to the opportunity for faculty from SUNY Cortland to apply for the above-mentioned USGS grant.

Student Highlights:

Eleven of our research students presented their work at the Fall 2022 SUNY Cortland Undergraduate Science Symposium and thirteen at Transformations 2023. Some of these students also had the opportunity to present their own research at local, regional, or national conferences. This research was made possible only with close mentorship by faculty members in the department. Banerjee mentored one student who presented at both events, one student who presented at Transformations, and one who presented at Transformations and also a conference off campus (in Ithaca). Curtis mentored one student who presented at both on campus symposia and at a conference (in CA), and one student who presented at Transformations and a conference (in CA). Davalos mentored one student who presented at Transformations and a conference in NYC, one student who presented at Transformations, and two students who presented at Transformations and the Fall 2022 CNYLA Symposium in Ithaca. Davis mentored two students who presented at both on campus symposia and at the Fall CNYLA Symposium. Ducey mentored two students who presented at Transformations. Eierman mentored two students who presented at both Transformations and the CNYLA Symposium. McCarthy mentored two students, one of whom presented at both on-campus symposia and one who presented at Transformations. Many of the above-mentioned faculty mentored students who had been awarded either URC Summer Research Fellowships or Cortland LSAMP Research Fellowships in the summer of 2022 in addition to hosting them in their research laboratories during the academic year.

Christina Chueiri was awarded this year's Outstanding Future Educator in the Biological Sciences. Trinity Tobin was awarded this year's Outstanding Student Research in Biological Sciences. Emily Miller was the recipient of this year's Aldo Leopold Award.

Graduates 2022-23: Fifty-seven undergraduate students graduated recently from the department including five August 2022 graduates, ten December 2022 graduates, and thirty-three May 2023 graduates.

Anti-Racism Strategic Plan.

We have included two students on our Biology Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (BIO-DEI) Committee each year (2020-2023). Our students have equal committee voices and have effected change by helping to organize two Diverse Voices in STEM seminars, organizing the initial training for the BIO-DEI implemented peer mentoring program (see details below), organizing social events (Bio Senior Send Off, Fall Festival), tabling about DEI issues in STEM, creating/curating a BIO-DEI Instagram account, and helping to develop a course retake reflection worksheet to support student success. We offered 1-cr. internships each semester to provide these students with credit and a record of their contributions to campus climate.

BIO-DEI supports the Biology Club as they organize social events to build a sense of belonging in the department. In 2022-23 this included a Fall Pumpkin Festival.

The Bio Peer Mentoring Program was initially developed by the two 2020-21 BIO-DEI student members. Additional BIO-DEI student members revised the plan and helped organize a two-hour mentoring training program. After 2 hours of training, 25 students became mentors in the Fall 2022 pilot. They mentored 39 incoming first year students that fall. BIO-DEI developed and ran a more comprehensive peer mentor training course in Spring 2023. This 0.5 credit, 4th quarter course included sessions taught by BIO-DEI faculty, as well as staff from the Multicultural Life and Diversity Office (MLDO), the Title IX Office, and a panel of previous peer mentors in the MLDO's Peer2Peer Mentoring Program. Seven new mentors took this training course. We will have 13-18 mentors for our Fall 2023 Bio Peer Mentoring Program, and we are currently recruiting incoming first year students during Summer Orientation.

A retake reflection worksheet was created for the department to provide to students retaking courses within our major to help them reflect, encourage them to reach out to their professors, and develop a plan for increased success as they retake the course to better support our students.

Chemistry

The Chemistry Department continued to be short staffed during academic year 2022 – 2023. Adjunct help is not readily available. There are few qualified and/or interested chemists in the Central New York area that are interested in working as an adjunct faculty member. Almost every member of the department worked overloads again this past year.

Two new faculty hires started in fall 2023 and a new staff member started at the end of May 2023. Dr. Sarah Wolf joined us as an Assistant Professor. Dr. Wolf's background is in physical chemistry, and she has direct experience teaching general chemistry and teaching STEM to high school students. Dr. Lynn Schmitt is joining the chemistry department as an Instructor of Chemistry. Dr. Schmitt's background is in teaching organic laboratories. Both have started working with undergraduate students on research projects. Dr. Wolf has started teaching both freshmen and upper division classes while Dr. Schmitt has started to revamp the organic laboratory sequence. James McLorn started working for the department as an Office Assistant at the end of May 2023. The faculty and staff of the Chemistry Department are very excited to welcome these new faces.

The department had two retirements this year. Gail Buckenmeyer retired in August of 2022 and Pamela Smith retired in January 2023. Both made significant contributions to our department and will be missed. A new organizational structure for administrative support was created where three departments (Chemistry, Geology and Physics) share the support of a single Department Secretary and an Office Assistant. The new line was filled in late May 2023 by James McLorn as noted above.

During the previous academic year, the Physics Department agreed to start assisting with the staffing for SCI 142. During year two of this arrangement, physics reduced the availability of their staffing for SCI 142 resulting in a Chemistry adjunct faculty member teaching a full time teaching load in the SCI 142 labs. This situation is going to continue in the next academic year.

Several students were awarded Undergraduate Research Council stipends and/or chemistry department funds to do research on campus again this year. The chemistry department adopted a new lab manual from the Open Educational Resources program through SUNY. There was a grant that was awarded from SUNY to the chemistry department to continue these innovations in the General Chemistry lab curriculum.

Highlights of department committee work include the following:

- The Curriculum (Chaired by Roering), DEI, Personnel (Chaired by Werner), Organic Chemistry, and General Chemistry Curriculum committees (Chaired by Downey) all had busy years.
- The Department had the external evaluator visit campus as part of the Major Program Review. The second evaluator was ill and not able to attend. The evaluator generated a final report. The next step is for the department to hold a meeting in fall 2023 to prepare a final response to the evaluator's report.

Communication & Media Studies

Anti-Racism

Dr. Ortega continues as co-chair of the President's Council on Inclusive Excellence and is an active affiliate member of the Africana Studies Department. Drs. Lawrence, Knopf and van der Veur are active members of the university Anti-Racism Task Force. Drs. Arras, Jia, Kaltefleiter, Knopf, van der Veur, and Yoo also note special efforts to increase anti-racism themes to their teaching as appropriate to specific courses. In addition, the department applied for and was awarded a Diversity Faculty Fellow line. Unfortunately we have been unsuccessful in our previous two attempts to fill this position.

Degrees granted and retention data

During 2021-2022, 87 degrees were granted in the department. This constitutes 12% of degrees conferred within Arts and Sciences and almost 6% of those granted by the university. The department expects those numbers to increase over the next 5-10 years as students in our new majors in Cinema Study and Media Production move through their programs. The department first year retention rate of 75 percent remains higher than that of the school (58%) or the university (65%). The retention rate for transfer students is currently 93 percent. Again, well above that of the school (71%) or university (74%).

Diversity

The percentage of female students in the department remains stable and is similar to rates for the school and the university. At present, 26% of CMS students identify as belonging to a historically marginalized group, compared with 25% for the school and 22% for the university.

Enrollment

Enrollment in the department has declined by 40% from its high in 2015. Faculty believe the enrollment decline the department has experienced is the result of three factors other than COVID:

a) There are currently three unfilled full-time teaching lines in the department. This negatively impacts our ability to work effectively with students and to provide relevant courses. The largest decline in enrollment has been in public relations and advertising – where we have seen significant turnover of faculty and where we are still missing two faculty members – despite a new hire for the Fall of 2022.

- b) The department has been in surge space for the past nine years. Visibility of the department has been diminished during this time and teaching facilities have been compromised. (Note that the department will be even more isolated in the coming years due to construction in Van Hoesen Hall.)
- c) Finally, there has been a national decline in the number of students entering communication related majors. Faculty attribute this to perceived –rather than actual declines in employment opportunity and significant negative rhetoric surrounding the press in recent years.

However, the department continues to enroll roughly 8% of majors in Arts and Sciences and 4% of the undergraduate students university wide. In addition, it is promising to note a slight increase in the number of majors in the last year (from 231 to 237) as well as significant growth in both our Cinema Studies (from 7 to 14 students) and Media Production majors (from 19 to 29 students).

Experiential Learning

The department sponsored 86 internships during the 2022-2023 academic term (202290, 202310, 202320, 202360). This is consistent with previous years. Most of these internships are structured to complete the three-credit internship requirement in Communication Studies. However, there were also several 1-16 credit internships. Communication and Media Studies students participated in Study Abroad programs last year. However, levels of participation have not yet returned to pre-pandemic levels. Faculty in the department remain committed to the promoting importance of global perspectives within the field of communication. Interest in some of our other experiential learning opportunities, such as participation in student media clubs, has also suffered due to the pandemic and the slow return to in-person learning. In addition, changing technologies are spurring changes in the primary focus of these opportunities.

Research

During 2022-2023, faculty were again active in a wide range scholarly and creative activities. These activities include book publications (2), book chapters (6), academic presentations (44), grant writing (2), film and video production, and book reviews. Seven of our full-time faculty report making contributions in one or more areas of scholarly pursuit. The department takes special note of the contributions of Dr. Knopf, who this year published an abstract and five book chapters, and was the series editor on two published books. Knopf also made 12 academic presentations.

Teaching

The department has 23 majors per Full-time faculty member. This is significantly higher than other departments in the School of Arts and Sciences, with an average of 16 and with the university average of 26. Likewise, the average student credit hours generated by each faculty member in the department (319) is the highest in the university. During 2021-2022 academic term, the CMS students constituted 8% of the students in Arts and Sciences, or 4% of the student body. The department generated more than 5% of the total student credit hours on the campus. The average class size in the department remains at 32 students, while the size for the university is only 24. The percentage of courses taught by FT faculty remains significantly below the average for the school and the university (59%, 69%, and 65% respectively).

<u>Curriculum Development</u>

In response to recommendations of the external program review, the department undertook significant revisions of the Communication Studies major. Under the newly approved structure, the common core has been reduced from 28 credit hours to 21 hours. This allowed for an additional six credits to be added to each of the concentrations, resulting in greater depth and breadth within each. Corresponding changes were also made to the minor in Communication Studies. The curriculum committee is now reviewing the major in New Communication Media to ensure that it reflects the growing importance of social media within the wider society. At the course level, the department wishes to highlight the addition of the Writing Intensive course COM 361 Sports Journalism. A second course, COM 3XX Social Media is currently

under development and will serve as a core element in the revised curriculum of our New Communication Media program.

Faculty Service

Faculty service to the institution and community is varied and substantial. While most faculty made significant contributions at the institutional level (37), several faculties also made significant contributions at the state, national, and international level (11). Local committee contributions (37) range from participation on Faculty Senate, the Academic Faculty Affairs Committee, and the Cultural and Intellectual Climate Committee, to work on the Orientation Committee and several of the General Education Assessment sub-committees. As noted above, three members of the department are active members of the university Anti-Racism Taskforce. Other significant campus wide contributions are made through work with the Africana Studies Department and direction of the Blackbird Film Festival.

Economics

Personnel

The changes that started last year with Dr. Lisi Krall and Dr. Brian Ward initiating their phased retirements continued this year with Professor Tim Phillips announcing his retirement. In addition, we have two faculty starting leaves. Dr. Alan Haight started a medical leave of absence in the Spring that will continue at least through Fall of 2023, and Dr. Jessica Carrick-Hagenbarth is splitting her maternity leave across the Spring and Fall 2023 semesters. Retirements leave the department without three key faculty members (2 tenure track and one full-time lecturer). The good news is that we conducted two successful searches this year. Dr. Eddy Junarsin comes to us from Murray State University and will be joining us as an Assistant Professor. In addition, we hired Dr. Stephen Maher, who comes to us from the Institute of Political Economy at Carleton University. We will also have Dr. Mark Prus returning to our department in Spring 2024, after he completes his sabbatical.

Teaching

Department faculty use a variety of delivery modes, moving from group activities to individual exercises, while effectively using the technology available in the rooms showing video clips, presentation slides, and demonstrating concepts using the Elmo. As our department surpassed 500 majors this year, advising continues to be a significant component of our workload. We stress the importance of advising and emphasize that it is much more than just registration. Our department's advising effectively mentors and supports our students both inside and outside of the classroom. After having Dr. Avanti Mukherjee receive the 2022 Excellence in Academic Advising Award, we added two more nominations for this award in 2023. We congratulate Dr. Jessica Carrick-Hagenbarth and Dr. Justin Bucciferro for embracing this important role in our department. In addition to advising, we cultivate a welcoming environment for our new students through both the summer advising sessions and major specific COR 101 sections. Kate Graham, Dr. Caitlin McKillip, and Dr. Kathleen Burke instructed our new majors in our major specific COR 101 sections again this year. Curricular innovations included two new courses added to our Applied and Policy Perspectives elective category for BUSE majors, and a new course African Economic Development. Dr. German Zarate continued to foster our relationship with Fulda University in Germany by participating in the International Summer school. He was also the catalyst for a new MOU for a dual degree with Pamukkale University. This degree program was approved by the Turkish Higher Education Council and will start this Fall. Dr. Wilson's Political Economy of the Adirondacks course partnered with LivingADK to support the third phase of their food systems research project. Students conducted qualitative survey interviews with local restaurant owners to understand the limitations and possibilities of sourcing more products for their menus locally. Also working in the food system, Dr. Burke's Community Innovation lab students helped launch the Cortland Harvest marketing plan developed for Seven Valleys Health Coalition. Dr. Burke also supported another iteration of the Cortland VITA program. This year 7 interns processed over 1000 tax returns!

The Economics department is celebrating three teaching awards. Dr. Samuel Jung received the Chow Fellowship from the Chinese Economist Society. Dr. Kathleen Burke was promoted to SUNY's highest rank by the State University Board of Trustees as Distinguished Teaching Professor. Additionally, Dr. Burke was awarded the Stephen J. Barnes Outstanding Faculty Member Award by the Student Government Association.

Research

The Economics department faculty were productive in their scholarly activity during the 2022-2023 academic year. Faculty members are actively presenting their research at local, national, and international conferences. Our research was disseminated in an edited volume, journal publications, podcasts, popular press, technical reports, and working papers. In sum, there were 52 works of scholarship produced by faculty members, including 10 publications and 25 presentations.

Service

All members of the Economics Department contributed department service during the 2022-23 academic year, including August and January advising, open houses, and presenting at Honors Convocation. All members must be involved in at least one of the department standing committees. Many Economics Department faculty members are very active in service to the school, university, local community, and the discipline. In sum, the Economics Department faculty members were involved in 112 service activities.

Enrollment Trends and Student Demographics

Our department continues to have the highest undergraduate enrollment in the School of Arts & Sciences, and our BUSE major had the fourth largest enrollment on campus. Between fall 2020 and fall 2021, our total enrollment increased from 413 to 507 majors (including HCM). We have a large group of incoming students for Fall 2023. With as many as 11 more transfer students yet to enroll in our introductory courses: ECO 105 (excluding the honors section), ECO 110, ECO 111, and MGT 250, 94 percent of our offered seats are filled. This is leading to an upward trend in majors per tenure and tenure track faculty. We increased to 33 from 28 last year. In comparison to other similarly sized programs on campus, our average class sizes are 7-8 students greater. In addition to full classrooms, advisement loads also increased.

Under-represented minorities/non-white students accounted for 23 percent of majors within the Economics department, which is larger than the corresponding proportion of all SUNY Cortland students (22 percent). The proportion of women in the Economics department has increased from 23 percent in 2021 to 27 percent this year, but still falls short of 38 percent in 2020 and is significantly lower than the 56 percent within the Cortland student body. The Economics department and its Anti-Racism Committee is aware of these imbalances and is undertaking initiatives to continue to attract and retain the diversity our student body and improve the experience of women and minority students in our major.

English

Scholarship

During the 2022-2023 academic year, the nineteen tenure-track faculty in the English Department collectively published one book (Bartlett book of poems) one edited collection (Bradway), four chapters in edited collections (Ahern, Bradway(3)), five articles in peer-reviewed journals (Bradway (2), Radus, Savonick (2)), two articles in magazines or trade publications (Bradway, Savonick), and two book reviews (Bender, Bradway).

Awards and Honors

- Lori Foster, Administrative Assistant for the English Department was awarded the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Classified Service
- Daniel Radus was named a Junior Fellow, Society of Fellows in Critical Bibliography
- Danica Savonick completed her ACLS Fellowship.
- Lawrence London Wilde, and English student, was awarded the Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence

Presentations and Invited Lectures

In 2022-23, English Department faculty presented seventeen refereed papers at international and national conferences. Several of these faculty presentations were at the most prestigious conferences in their fields: the Modern Language Association (Bradway, Harbin, Savonick), the American Studies Association (Savonick), The Conference on College Composition and Communication (Jackson, Raw), Computers and Writing (Raw). Tyler Bradway presented an impressive four invited talks or keynote addresses at other colleges and universities including Ithaca College, Westchester University, Virginia Tech, and USC.

Laura Dunbar continues as co-managing editor of the only peer-reviewed journal dedicated to Engagement Scholarship in the SUNY community, and is responsible for accepting and managing all submissions, including managing the double-blind peer-review process, reporting to JoSE's Board of Directors, and mentoring student articles.

Grants and Fellowships

- English faculty were awarded several Faculty Development Small Grants, IDA Awards, CALS grants, a Raquette Lake Grant and an ASC Grant.
- Cori McKenzie was awarded the ELATE Research Initiative Grant, \$2500

Campus Cultural Climate and Transformational Education

• In its eighth year, the Department's Distinguished Voices in Literature lecture series (organized by Heather Bartlett) hosted four events: a Reading by author Gina Nut, The Van Burd Memorial Lecture "Literacy at the End of the World" by scholar Asilia Franklin-Phipps, a reading by poet Benjamin Garcia, and a reading by author Barrett Bowlin

Enrollment Trends

- English Department undergraduate enrollments declined from 128 in fall of 2021 to 111 in fall of 2022. Enrollments in our Adolescence Education in English major saw the biggest decline with strong with 78 majors in fall of 2021 and 62 in the fall of 2022. Professional Writing majors have also declined from 25 in the fall of 2021 compared to 17 in the fall of 2022 and 22 in the fall of 2019. The English major saw an increase in enrollment from 25 in the fall of 2021 to 32 in the fall of 2022. The English Department also serves over 260 ECD and IEC majors with concentrations in Humanities and English Language Arts.
- The MA and MAT in English enrollments remain solid with a total of 19 graduate students enrolled in the fall of 2022. We hope to see enrollments increase further as our 4+1 program grows.

Composition and College Writing Programs

The English Department continues to teach more than 1200 students per semester and produced a total of 6776 student credit hours in fall 2022, more than any other department in the university.

Curricular Development

This year, the English Department implemented its 4+1 program which allows advanced undergraduate ENG and PWR majors to complete an MA in English in five years. The program began last year with only 2 students and grew to a total of 7 students accepted into the program by spring 2023.

Anti-Racism

This year, our Van Burd Memorial Lecture (Distinguished Voices in Literature) was given by Dr. Asilia Franklin-Phipps, an assistant professor in the Department of Teaching and Learning at SUNY New Paltz. Her work explores race, visual culture, affect and implications on pedagogy and education. The department also made copies of the book, Caste, by Isabel Wilkerson, available to faculty.

In the spring, the English department sent a climate survey to all English Department students which had an almost 9% response rate. This survey indicates that the responding students felt comfortable in the English Department with 84% strongly agreeing that the department has a strong commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion, and 10% agreeing. 90% of respondents felt that they were treated with respect by the English Department faculty. Our goal for next year is to increase the response rate.

Faculty Hiring

The English Department successfully hired one additional tenure-track faculty member in the 2022-2023 academic year. Dr Ivana Ancic will begin teaching world literature for the department in the fall of 2023 With the creation of four developmental writing sections and the establishment of the Writing Center, the Writing Program continues to face staffing issues. The percentage of courses in CPN taught by part-time faculty in the fall of 2022 was 38% and is projected to rise to 45% in the fall of 2023.

Geography

During the 2022-23 year, the Geography Department was staffed with four full-time tenure track faculty: Drs. Christopher Badurek, Ibipo Johnston-Anumonwo, Melinda Shimizu and Wendy Miller. Our long-time colleague Dr. Scott Anderson completed his final semester of phased retirement in Fall 2022 and his line is now open. We also relied on two part-time faculty: Dr. James Darlington and Ms. Irina Kolesnik. Our department provides three different majors, two minors, and numerous General Education courses. In fall 2022, Chris Badurek took on the role of Department Chair after Wendy Miller's nearly 7 years of service.

Teaching and Applied Learning

Teaching and applied learning are core components of the Geography Department. Our faculty provide extensive service to general education courses as part of their regular teaching load. Our course offerings in *Cultural Geography, Human Geography,* and *Will the World Provide* are popular with students in departments across campus. Our general education course offerings are generally at maximum and frequently overenrolled, especially in fall semesters. Our course offerings for our majors tend to run between 50-80% full as is to be expected with an average number of majors of about 27 per semester. These major course offerings are also frequently taken by students in Geology, Environmental Geoscience, and Conservation Biology.

Dr. Johnston-Amunonwo and Dr. Miller carry an especially heavy load of general education courses and frequently work with students new to Cortland and are therefore valuable to the entire university community. Dr. Shimizu has also provided education majors a valuable learning experience in her *Intro:* Cartography and GIS courses, a trend we would like to see continued as a component of educational technology skills for new teachers. Of additional note is the sustained interest in the course Climate Change and Urban Sustainability taught as a 1-credit mid-semester course. With such demand, the Department is interested in increasing offerings related to sustainability and the climate crisis.

Over the past year, our students have engaged in many independent study and internship experiences with our faculty on a number of applied GIS topics. Students gave presentations along with their mentors at the SUNY Cortland Diversity Conference, Transformations 2023, and two professional conferences. One of our students, Bettina Bonfiglio, completed her Honor's Thesis and was awarded second place in the Undergraduate Student Research Paper Contest at the Middle States AAG Conference. She and another of our students were offered graduate assistantships to attend the Geography Graduate Program at Binghamton University. As of the end of May 2023, four of our graduates were offered employment and two were attending graduate school at Binghamton.

Research, Scholarly, and Creative Activity

Geography Department faculty published peer-reviewed articles, peer-reviewed chapters, conference proceedings, newsletter articles, and book reviews on GIS and community development, UAS technology (drones), earth science education, and African geography. Additionally, they have given conference presentations, served as session chairs, participated in conferences, and received both external and internal grants. Of note is the on-going funded work by Dr. Miller with the Institute for Geospatial and Drone Technology and Dr. Badurek's NEH Curriculum Grant on place-based learning.

Service

Department faculty served in leadership positions in the SUNY Faculty Senate and SUNY Cortland Faculty Senate Cortland YWCA, Cortland Zonta, the City of Cortland's Landscape Design Commission, the Syracuse City School District Geospatial Technology Advisory Council, and the Cortland County Planning Board. In addition, faculty excel in professional service serving as Past Presidents and Board Members of organizations, manuscript and grant reviewers, editorial and executive board members, and conference organizers. Of particular note are the AP Human Geography leadership by Dr. Johnston-Anumonwo and the co-organizing of the highly successful Great Expectations Teaching and Learning Conference by Dr. Shimizu.

Anti-Racism Strategic Plan

Our Anti-racism Strategic Plan focused on book discussions of *Decolonizing Geography* (Radcliffe 2022) in Fall and Colors of Nature (Deming and Savoy 2011) in Spring. These books were selected for the exploration of DEISJ content in the context of geography subject matter. In fall, our conversation centered on decolonizing our curriculum, which means to include the contributions of diverse viewpoints other than the predominant western perspectives. We actively discussed how we can bring decolonizing perspectives to our course offerings in our human geography general education courses but also in the ways of thinking evident in our geographic information systems courses. In spring, our conversation was on how people of color experience the natural landscape. In this case, we explored how our students may bring their lived experiences into a geography or GIS classroom and how we can better appreciate their lived experiences. In addition, we discussed how we can better understand how students from different ethnic backgrounds can experience the same place in different ways (e.g., Cortland, New York City, or the Adirondacks). Although we have been including these efforts in our teaching in our human, cultural, and environmentally themed courses, our discussion prompted sharing of teaching experiences and interactions with past students that may make our department an even more welcoming and supportive learning environment for students of color. We expect these discussions to positively impact students in such courses as Human Geography, Cultural Geography, Social Geography, Will the World Provide, and our array of GIS courses. We also focused efforts to support our students of color in their applied learning experiences. An outcome of these efforts are presentations by geography students at the SUNY Cortland Diversity Conference and a presentation by students from Dr. Johnston's Social Geography course at Transformations 2023. These efforts have culminated in an Undergraduate Summer Research Fellowship for one of our students of color to conduct research on the impacts of redlining on tree composition. These efforts have spurred Dr. Badurek's research on impacts of redlining and forest composition as well as led to the development of a new GIS elective, GIS and Environmental Justice, to be taught by Dr. Shimizu in Spring 2024.

Geology

Research and Scholarly Activities

Research with students remains central to the work of faculty. This year two students were mentored in research by faculty (David Barclay and Robert Darling). They both met the SUNY Chancellor during his visit to SUNY Cortland.

Service

All five tenured/tenure-track faculty have been active in departmental committee work this past year. Dr. Darling was particularly busy giving talks on campus this past year: a Sandwich Seminar on the result of his sabbatical research, a talk for the Brooks Lecture Series, and one of the Commencement speeches. All faculty have also been active in service for the College, SUNY, professional organizations and the local community.

Staffing

The department continued to be staffed by six fulltime faculty (D. Barclay, J. Barclay, R. Darling, G. Gleason, L. Jin and C. McRoberts) in 2022 -2023. This year we welcomed a PRODiG Visiting Scholar, Tiffany Hamm. Ms. Hamm is a doctoral student at Syracuse University in the Science Education program. She taught SCI 141 lectures in both Fall and Spring semesters, and AED 442 (Methods 1) in the Spring.

Julie Barclay announced her intention to leave her position in May 2023. After a national search, adjunct faculty member Dr. Jennifer Kidder was selected as our new FTL beginning in fall 2023.

Our instructional support technician, Zachary Sedor, left his position at the beginning of February 2023. Zachary Eridani was hired to fill the temporary IST position while we conduct the search for the fulltime hire. Mr. Eridani is a graduate of the Physics Department and concentrated in Geophysics.

A wrinkle developed with our AA position this past year. After the Chemistry AA, Pam Smith, retired in December of 2022, the VP of Finance decided to replace her with an Office Assistant (OA) and add the Chemistry department to our (GLY/PHY) AA's list of responsibilities. While the new OA has taken on some of Chelsea Guy's responsibilities, they are not allowed to have P-cards, so Chelsea has to keep track of three departmental budgets. This was particularly stressful in spring 2023 because the new OA was not hired until May. The three departmental chairs are discussing how to best streamline the purchasing process so that the budgets can be tracked.

Anti-Racism Strategic Plan

We continue to look to our professional societies (i.e., Geological Society of America, American Geophysical Union and other more specialized societies) for learning opportunities for us this year as everyone in the geosciences explores aspects of anti-racism and how we can make our discipline more diverse and inclusive. One of our students is a participant in the LSAMP programs on campus. Data from the Institutional Research and Analysis Office indicates that 20% of our departmental undergraduate students (Fall 2022) are from under-represented/non-white groups. This number increased from 15% in Fall 2021. Our average over five years is 17%. It is difficult to review performance indicators for these students because not all of them have self-identified.

Student Recruitment

We continued our efforts to convince more of the admitted students to come to Cortland. We sent fossils to the accepted GLY and AES students. We had been looking for something different to send to the ENVG accepted students because we weren't sure a fossil was the right message. This year, we sent the ENVG students a piece of the mineral lepidolite, a Lithium ore, along with an explanation about solving climate change by switching to carbon-free electricity and the need for lithium batteries to make this transition. We hope this change will attract students who want to apply earth science to environmental issues. Another new effort is a video that one of our students put together with the help of Dr. Jin. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=lON46rV4CNU

Our efforts were successful in recruiting more students than last year. As of June 30, we have 8 first year students joining us and 7 transfer students joining us in Fall 2023. For next year, we have created a flyer to send to High School guidance counselors with simple descriptions of our majors and the careers they lead to.

Facilities

Repeated flooding of the Ground floor of Bowers 1 during the fall semester was trying. Facilities and IR determined the source of the water. Sealing of all the new conduit from the outdoor lighting project that feeds into the Electrical room in Bowers finally stopped this flooding. We are encouraged to hear that Bowers 2 is closer to the top of the list in the Facilities Master Plan. Outside of Bowers, we were able to have facilities tilt a few of the layered boulders next to the parking lot. We will be using these as examples of what happens to sedimentary rocks during Plate Tectonics, and for demonstrating the use of Brunton compasses.

History

This year we welcomed Dr. Anisha Saxena to our ranks. Dr. Saxena has already made a mark by offering innovative courses and earning praise from students for her exceptional teaching. She also generously offered to teach a summer graduate course which helped the department meet some of the program requirement needs of students (discussed below). Regrettably, Drs. Gigi Peterson and Amy Schutt both announced their intent to retire at the conclusion of the 2023-24 academic year. Both have been stalwart members of the department for many years, particularly in their roles as faculty in the Adolescence Education-Social Studies program. Dr. Brett Troyan resigned last year, following a three- year leave of absence. Dr. Troyan taught Latin American history and this critical curriculum gap persists. We have also not replaced Dr. Celeste McNamara who resigned a few years ago, leaving another important curriculum gap in Early Modern Europe. The same is true for Dr. Judy Van Buskirk's early American history/American Revolution position. We may be reaching a crisis point in terms of the US history curriculum. With Van Buskirk and Schutt's retirements and with an anticipated leave of absence for Dr. Randi Storch, the US history faculty ranks will be depleted. Our two other US historians (Sheets and Faulkenbury) both have competing responsibilities that prevent them from picking up the slack. All of this points to the need for serious discussion this coming year regarding staffing needs for the department.

Since our MA program went entirely on-line beginning in the fall of 2021, our enrollment has soared. From a low of 3 students, we now have more than thirty. Nearly all of these students are teachers or anticipate a teaching career. The flexibility of our on-line program is appealing especially to this population of students. We thank Dr. Laura Gathagan for coordinating the program and navigating the transition to its on-line incarnation. However, the growing pains of a program experiencing rapid enrollment are challenging. Our recent practice has been to offer two graduate classes per semester but that is no longer tenable. The department, however, is eager to ensure the integrity and quality of the program by maintaining existing enrollments and increasing course offerings so as to meet the degree requirement needs of enrolled

students. We believe strongly that our synchronous online program embraces a particular pedagogical approach that requires smaller course enrollments than asynchronous online programs. We look forward to conversations with the administration that will identify shared commitments to quality and student satisfaction.

While our graduate enrollment is exploding, we continue to see healthy undergraduate enrollments, particularly in adolescence education-social studies. We have an unusually large "bubble" of SST majors who are rising seniors. At the same time, our fall 2023 enrollment, which at last count included 70 new students, is nearly all intended SST majors. While this is a testament to the exceptionally fine reputation our program continues to enjoy throughout New York State, it does put pressure on our SST program while also making us vulnerable to adverse enrollment trends. The department is mindful that the political landscape might dissuade some students from pursuing a career in middle and high school history teaching. We have not yet seen the effects of the culture wars in New York or at SUNY Cortland, but the department is aware of the need to discuss ways to diversify our majors.

The department had another successful year in scholarship and grant activities. Faculty reported a total of 90 scholarship activities, including 24 publications. Among those include peer-reviewed journal articles, edited volumes, book reviews and other publications. Drs. Candelora, Faulkenbury and Ukelina published books this year: Ancient Egyptian Society: Challenging Assumptions, Exploring Approaches; Teaching Public History; and Who Owns Africa? Neocolonialism, Investment, and the New Scramble, respectively. Dr. Gathagan also edited another annual volume of the Haskins Society Journal, her tenth published by Boydell and Brewer. Faculty also published book chapters and journal articles, including contributions to South Asian Studies, The Public Historian, and the Oxford Research Encyclopedia of African History. Faculty book reviews appeared in a wide range of publications. Additionally, faculty were active in state, national, and international conferences. History faculty gave 32 presentations, including ones in Germany, Greece, India, Portugal and at venues across the United States. History faculty were represented at the Organization of American Historians and the American Historical Association annual meetings, the Iberian Conference on African Studies, the International Conference on Global Studies, the Association for Asian Studies Annual Conference, the Agricultural History Society Annual Meeting, the International Society for the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning Annual conference, and the Annual Meeting of the American Schools of Oriental Research, among others. Several faculty also were active in the area of Sponsored Programs. Drs. Sheets and Storch received another National Endowment for the Humanities grant (their seventh). This grant took the form of a faculty study group that invited SUNY historians to discuss the scholarship and reimagine the teaching of the Gilded Age and Progressive Era. This was in addition to their current NEH grant working with middle and high school teachers. They submitted another NEH grant (pending) and are on the cusp of submitting another three-year US Department of Education grant. Dr. Candelora received a 2022 Faculty Research Grant and Dr. Saxena received one for the 2023 round. Dr. Gathagan used a Friends of the Princeton Library grant to underwrite a two week research trip to the Princeton University archives. Finally, Dr. Ukelina received a Carnegie African Diaspora Fellowship.

The same commitment that defines their scholarly engagement was on display in the area of service. A number of faculty remain active in international education, including service on the Clark Center for Global Engagement and various area studies programs and committees. History faculty are represented on university-wide committees, including Faculty Senate, GFEC, Teacher Education Council, Honors Program, Clark Center, International Studies, the Cultural and Intellectual Climate Committee, the College Research Committee, Academic Standing Committee, Academic Faculty Affairs, UUP, CGIS, and the Center for Ethics, Peace, and Social Justice. Moreover, faculty have taken active roles in their professional organizations, serving on editorial boards and governance structures, and organizing programs and panels at regional, national, and international venues. Examples are too numerous to itemize but several suggest the range of

substantive engagement typical of the department: Dr. Candelora serves on the American Research Center in Egypt's Google Arts and Culture Project; Drs. Faulkenbury and Ukelina serve on the university's Africana Studies Committee; Dr. Ukelina also chairs the Nigerian Taskforce on SDGs and Cultural Heritage sites; Dr. Storch is editor of Labor Online and serves on LAWCHA's teaching and curriculum development committees. She also chaired the Faculty Senate ad hoc committee investigating the possibility of a university-wide common hour. Dr. Moranda coordinates the Project for Eastern and Central Europe and serves on the Honors Program Advisory Council. Dr. Gathagan concluded her ten-year stint as editor of the Haskins Society Journal and is newly elected to the society's executive board representing North America. Dr. Faulkenbury serves on the Committee on Teaching Effectiveness and was active in the community through his leadership of the History Book Club at the Cortland Free Library and as a member of the Beloved Community Narratives Project.

We continue to explore ways to enhance our curriculum, including ways our curriculum can help advance the university's anti-racism commitments. Much of the service and programming supported and sponsored by the department and its faculty was connected to those anti-racist initiatives, including panel discussions, book chats, and other campus programming. Dr. Sheets participated in the summer Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Institute sponsored by the Chief Diversity Officer and he anticipates incorporating into department conversations the results of that experience to further our efforts to offer a more inclusive learning culture for all students.

International Studies

There were 2 events organized and 16 events co-sponsored by the International Studies Program during the 2022-2023 academic year. The two major events organized were developed to increase recruitment efforts for the IST major/minor, including the International Studies Information Session, September 2022, and Careers in International Studies, April 2023, featuring a panel of IST alumni: Melissa Alvisi '22, Naomi Higgins '21, Samantha King' 18, and Rebecca McGory '16. During this academic year one new colleague joined the IST Faculty Advisory Committee: Mason Kim, Political Science (Asia)

Alexandru Balas served as one of the three organizers of the Global Model European Union Conference, New York City, January 2023. He also advised a team of 4 SUNY Cortland students who participated in the conference, which was attended by approximately 100 participants from 13 universities from 4 countries.

Alexandru Balas served as a panelist/moderator at the following campus events:

- The Sportwashing Panel, organized in fall 2022
- Western Balkans Negotiations with the European Union Panel, organized in spring 2023
- Internationalization opportunities for new faculty members, April 2023 (co-organized with Mary Schlarb)

Dr. Balas represented the International Studies Program at a Presentation for International Studies majors at Tompkins-Cortland Community College in Fall 2022. He also gave a presentation about the European Union to the Sennightly Literary Club, Homer, NY, November 2022.

Prof. Balas played a role in hosting international visitors, including two guests from our partner university Fulda School of Applied Sciences in December 2022 and four Erasmus+ Key Action 1 guests from Babes-Bolyai University in April 2023.

Alexandru Balas presented his research at several conferences between June 1, 2022 and May 31, 2023, including the 15th Pan-European Conference on International Relations, the Ottoman Lands – the Balkans, Anatolia and Beyond Conference, ASTENE, and at meetings held in Baku, Azerbaijan and Bogota, Colombia.

He had several talks accepted for conferences held in summer 2023 at the University of Aruba, Babes-Bolyai University, the 29th International Conference of Europeanists, Iceland, and the Congress of the Society for the Global Nineteenth Century Studies, Singapore. Professor Balas, together with Andreas Kotelis, 2017 Visiting Instructor in International Studies, SUNY Cortland, and Noam Ebner (Creighton University) organized two webinars for the European Union Delegation in Washington, D.C. regarding Model EU Simulations. He also organized the 1st Pan-Canadian Model European Union Conference in Ottawa, May 5-7, 2023.

As of May 2023, there were 14 majors in the IST Program and 2 students who paid deposits for fall 2023 admission. In May 2022 there were 16 majors (including dual and triple majors) enrolled in the International Studies major. There were 5 students enrolled in the IST Minor in spring 2023. The retention rate for fall 2022-fall 2023 is at 100% with the 2 IST majors who started as freshmen in fall 2022 continuing as IST majors at SUNY Cortland (100% retention within the major). It is important to note that most IST majors add the major within their first two years at Cortland or transfer from a different school into the major.

The Diversity Report shows that International Studies has 42% non-white students (while the average for the College of Arts and Sciences is 25% non-white and for the university is 22% non-white) with a gender ratio of 83% women to 17% men.

IST students continue to be very strong students, particularly remarkable given their rigorous courses and language study. The average GPA for all IST majors is 3.22 and 8 of them maintained a GPA above 3.7. Typically, 35-40% of the IST majors are on the Dean's List each semester and roughly 15% are on the President's List. Usually, 10% of the IST majors are in the Top 5% of their classes. At the Honor's Convocation, the Sidney R. Waldron Award for Academic Excellence was awarded to Sam Culwell '23.

Mathematics

Overview

The department currently has about 80 majors, about 65 of whom are in the AEM program. We finished the year with six tenured faculty, three more on the tenure track, and one full-time lecturer. Immediately after the semester ended, one of our non-tenured faculty members (Nicholas Packauskas) resigned. We employ about six part-time instructors. The department conducted a successful search resulting in the hiring of a new statistician, Keshab Dahal

Curriculum

After rewriting our department-level SLOs in the previous year to make them objective and measurable, we began assessing them in a more routinized way this year.

We have nearly completed our proposal for the addition of a statistics minor but missed the deadline for the 2023/24 catalog. We expect to submit this in the fall of 2024 and to have it published in the 2024/25 catalog.

We administered a new calculus placement exam this past fall and spring. Results are no longer used as a binding recommendation, but as a strong warning that if students score poorly on it, they might be ill-prepared for success in Calculus I. Eventually, it will also be given to all Calc A students as well.

MAT 425 was taught by the physics department for the first time in quite a while. This course has value for physics and chemistry students but does not address the needs of math majors as well as we'd like. We hope that having physics instructors teach the course this spring will help us open a productive dialog in the 2023/24 school year with these two additional departments regarding the objectives and contents of this course to meet all of our needs.

Student Awards

Enrollment

A review of total undergraduate enrollments in MAT and AEM over the last 20 years revealed the following: Enrollments hovered around 150 students from 2003 to 2007, then increased to a peak of about 250 between 2009 and 2011. Since then, enrollments have steadily declined, dipping below 100 this year. Much of this has been driven by state and national trends in the waxing and waning of enrollments in all teacher preparation programs.

Anti-Racism Strategic Plan

During our program review in 2021, our external reviewers suggested that we needed to craft a department-level statement of belonging. We have begun and plan to continue to gather ideas from other departments to see what we might be able to do to address this as an ongoing agenda item.

Modern Languages

Publications and Working Papers

In 2022, Christopher Gascon published a book chapter titled "Supplementary Aesthetics, Affordances, and Dynamic Props: Added Objects in Isabel Ramos's El perro del hortelano (2004)" in *Staging and Stage Décor: Early Modern Spanish Theater.* In 2023, Codruta Temple coauthored an article (Balea, B., Kovacs, M., & Temple C., "Kick-Start Literacy for All. Comparative Results from Romanian Preparatory Grade Classrooms") accepted by the *Journal of Pedagogy* (Romania). Several department faculty members reported on works in progress, including Hongli Fan (3), Christopher Gascon (1), and Odalis Hidalgo (2).

Presentations, Grants, and Other Scholarly Activity

In the 2022-2023 academic year, the Modern Languages Department faculty listed 23 presentations, 7 of which were reported by Odalis Hidalgo, and 7 reported by Shena Salvato; 4 grants received by Odalis Hidalgo and 3 grants received by Patricia Martínez.

Awards and Honors

Christopher Gascon was invited to serve as Guest Editor of a special issue of *Symposium* on Spanish Golden Age drama. He was also invited by Teatro Círculo, a Spanish language theater in New York City, to speak on the subject of *dramaturgia novohispana* (Early Modern "New World" dramaturgy) in a symposium on the opening night of the company's production of *La monja alférez* (*Lieutenant Nun*) by Juan Ruiz de Alarcón.

Professional Development

Our faculty reported having engaged in 27 professional development activities, with Shena Salvato accounting for 11 of them, and Odalis Hidalgo for 8 of them.

Service

Department faculty reported a total of 80 service activities during the last academic year. We are particularly grateful to Patricia Martinez and Shena Salvato, who went above and beyond their contractual obligations by serving on the search committee for a TESOL assistant professor.

Enrollment

The data provided by Institutional Research and Analysis show relatively constant enrollment in our French programs over the last five years, enrolling between 6 and 8 majors each year. The department has averaged 3 French minors per year during the same time.

Enrollment in the Adolescence Education Spanish and Adolescence Education French & Spanish programs has dropped from 21 in 2021 to 18 in 2022. More worrisome, however, is the drop in enrollment in the Spanish program, from 36 in 2020, to 22 in 2021, to only 8 in 2022. Enrollment in the Spanish minor shows a similar trend to that of the major. The number of Spanish minors has dropped from 48 in 2020, to 31 in 2021, and to 29 in 2022. The department needs to discuss new ways to promote these majors and minors.

When the certification and non-certification TESOL majors are analyzed together, our overall enrollment shows a constant decrease in numbers over the last 5 years. The decline in the certification major is particularly striking, from 35 in 2020, to 19 in 2021, to 11 in 2022. As discussed in previous years' annual reports, a decline in the TESOL enrollment was expected. The major reason for this decline is the possibility that education majors from other areas now have of receiving additional certification in TESOL with only the course work we offer through the TESOL minor. We were aware that the promotion of our minor could negatively impact our numbers in the major. However, we decided to put the interest of our Cortland students and, especially, that of English language learners across the state of New York first. What really matters to us is that our English language learners will be better served by a combination of TESOL majors and non-TESOL majors with solid knowledge of second language acquisition. Nonetheless, this decline does cause frustration and concern at the department level.

The TESOL minor had a significant decrease in 2020. It had a minor recovery in 2021 (from 18 to 20) but dropped again (to 17) in 2022. A reason for cautious optimism is the fact that Adolescence Education English has added ESL 402, one of our TESOL methodology courses, to their curriculum. With this, the interest in the TESOL minor is expected to increase for these majors, as they will be able to complete the minor with the addition of only 4 of our core courses.

On the bright side, enrollment in our graduate TESOL program has increased sharply over the last two years, from about 12 students in 2021 to around one hundred students in 2023. This increase can be clearly attributed to our offering the program fully online since 2021, as well as to the hard work that the graduate program coordinator, Paulo Quaglio, has done to recruit and advise students.

Student Highlights

Last but certainly not least, it is our honor to highlight some of our students' accomplishments.

Performing Arts

At the beginning of this academic year, a faculty member abruptly resigned, leaving the production schedule and auditions in a lurch. The faculty quickly adapted by moving CABARET from the fall into the spring. This alteration placed a significant hardship on the both the scene and costume shops as two musicals (SEUSSICAL THE MUSICAL and CABARET) in one semester is a daunting creative task, but everyone worked together so that the students had the opportunity to work on two musicals.

This year, for the very first time, SUNY Cortland and Cortland Repertory Theatre (CRT) collaborated on the production, PROOF. Utilizing student actors and SUNY designers, the production was performed in CRT's downtown location. SUNY students received the opportunity to perform in a different space and obtained a different type of acting credit for their resume since the play was a co-production. This type of experience is one that the faculty had been trying to establish for a number of years and felt both designers and students found the partnership very beneficial. This year, our two companies are working together again on the inaugural production of LOVE, BILLY. We are hoping this artistic relationship develops into something both theatres participate in as part of both theatres' regular seasons.

As a continued commitment to our Anti-Racism Strategic Plan, we hired Rodney Hudson to direct PROOF. A Professor at Syracuse University, Mr. Hudson presented material to the cast and crew about Black and Latin American mathematicians, including the issue of women of color in STEM fields.

Another collaborative initiative the department headed this year was the production of THE BONE HARP. In August of 2022, CreateTheater's Executive Producer Cate Cammarata and Judith Estrine, Artistic Director of Prism Stage Company announced a new Play Development Partnership in order to develop new plays in NYC. The companies accept submissions for new plays and musicals. The winning entries are then performed in the city. SUNY Cortland is a part of this new artistic project. Cortland and CreateTheater have developed a Professional College Musical Theatre Partnership. Cortland professors are a part of the vetting process for the musical submissions and Performing Arts students make up the cast in the musical that's been chosen for a reading/performance. This year, THE BONE HARP was one of the entries chosen for presentation in NYC. This collaboration is highly advantageous. For the program, it's another opportunity for additional exposure to professionals in the city, and for the students, they get to network with upcoming librettists, composers, and lyricists and perform in front of an audience that could lead to representation or additional work.

Two of the department's performing ensembles welcomed new directors in 2022-23. Renee Heitmann was hired to direct the College Singers, and Max Buckholtz was named as the new director of the College-Community Orchestra. Professor David Neal continued as director of the Choral Union.

Philosophy

As always, we are very grateful for the continued institutional support for our work by President Bitterbaum, Provost Prus, and Dean Mattingly. Philosophy faculty members continue to offer excellent courses, serve the college and community in a wide array of activities, and produce scholarship and service to their profession of the highest standard. For a small department, we continue to have an impact beyond our size: on campus through our service on many committees, and through our leadership of the Center for Ethics, Peace and Social Justice (including Sophia's Garden, the Welcoming Strangers Project among other initiatives), and the Mediation and Resolution Service; in the University through leadership in the University Faculty Senate and the Distinguished Academy; and off campus through active engagement in professional and community organizations.

This was a challenging year for the department, as two of its four full-time members were on leave, one for a semester, and one for the full year. This meant that the bulk of service work fell to the other two. Even so, the Philosophy Department continued to be productive. Of note, during the year, tenured faculty members:

- Served on or chaired/directed over 29 committees, offering leadership to the campus and university disproportionate to the size of the department
- Published three books, a book translation, two book reviews, and made 13 presentations or workshops.
- Dr. Fitz-Gibbon continued his work as chair of the Mediation and Resolution Service at Cortland, a board member and Secretary/Treasurer of the SUNY Distinguished Academy, a member of the SUNY Distinguished Service Professor Council, and continued to work toward the campus Strategic Priority of wellness through taijiquan and qigong classes for the campus and wider community. His publications this year were a book, an invited foreword to a book and a book in his series with Brill Academic publishers. He taught two workshops on Medical Ethics for the Arnot Ogden Medical Center in Elmira NY.
- Dr. Karkov was chair of College Intellectual Climate Committee in the fall, sat on the sub-school committee for Arts & Sciences in the fall, and was the main advisor to the Black Student Union.
- Dr. Nagel received the DiNardo/Waring award, published her Ubuntu book and a book chapter on Ubuntu in an edited volume on African philosophy. She gave two international keynotes (Germany and Kenya), and her international professional obligations included the Fulda partnership. She continues to grow Sophia's Garden (SG) with five active researchers publishing on this applied learning experience. Student success in SG is measurable and partners in the field are engaged and asking for more volunteers and time slots. She participated in discussions on 4+1 in Philosophy and Education with more education majors taking philosophy as a minor, in part due to the SG experience. She served on the Summer Diversity Institute on campus with over 20 faculty and professional staff.
- Dr Purcell's book *Discourses of the Elders* was published in the spring.
- We acknowledge the invaluable work of our pool of capable adjuncts: Dr. Daniel Murphy, Dr. Ute Ritz-Deutsch, Dr. Noelle Chaddock, Dr. Jane Hall Fitz-Gibbon, and Ms. Kaeti Manning, and our admin treatise assistant Julie Simser.
- Beside our focus on developing the philosophy program, we serve the Childhood/Early Childhood
 Department whose students in the Humanities Concentration must take three upper level
 philosophy classes, the Criminology major (PHI 205 Prisons and Punishment and PHI 340 Philosophy
 of Law).
- We continue our policy of including gender equity, diversity perspectives, and anti-racism in all our courses.

Physics

Faculty and student research

- Eric Edlund published 4 papers this year, two in the American Journal of Physics, two with collaborators outside of physics, one in the Journal of the Scholarship of Engagement, and one in the Eastern Economics Journal. In addition to this work, he collaborated with two SUNY Cortland undergraduates on a project related to water waves. Additionally, he gave a physics colloquium related to orbital dynamics.
- Moataz Emam published 2 papers this year and worked on the second edition of his textbook on the topic of Covariant Physics. He also collaborated with a SUNY Cortland undergraduate.
- Sean Nolan and Beth Pennell presented at SUNY Cortland's Great Expectations teaching conference on using Wooclap for formative assessment in large classes. Sean is also continuing with his collaboration "Investigating Effective Teaching Through a Culturally Responsive Lens".
- Doug Armstead collaborated with one SUNY Cortland undergraduate as part of the Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation (LSAMP) program.
- Former faculty member David Kornreich and former student Karl Hipius released the paper they wrote together on arXiv.
- The activity of students in departmental research was showcased in several venues including a poster at the science crawl night and during the tour new SUNY Chancellor took of Bowers Hall in the spring. Students were further supported by a presentation on NSF-REUs by Chelsea Guy.

Diversity

The diversity of the physics teaching staff became more solidly grounded with the full time hiring Beth Pennell as a full time lecturer. Student Angel Chauca-Rosendo participated in research in the LSAMP program during summer 2022 and attended a Symposium at Ithaca College organized by Central NY LSAMP consortium.

Interdepartmental collaboration

The physics department has returned to its collaboration with the chemistry department in the teaching of SCI142, an important class for childhood education majors.

Marketing to prospective students

While the physics department consistently participated by Cortland organized student outreach events, with Chelsea Guy's help we have started to produce and send mailings to prospective students

Physics club

The physics club returned to their active presence on campus. Their astronomy nights in February and April were particularly well attended. Other events included Physics Jeopardy and Haunted Bowers in fall 2022, Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) In STEM Info night, Physics Kahoot and the Physics Club End of the Year Party in spring 2023. Physics club representatives attended the Student Club Fairs sponsored by SGA in both the fall and spring.

Political Science

The Political Science Department welcomed two new faculty colleagues during the 2022-2023 academic year. Professors Joseph Anthony and Mason Kim both had very successful years. Both are excellent teachers who engage well with students. We also completed a successful DFF search and are excited to welcome a new faculty member, Dr. Juan Diego Prieto Sanabria, in fall 2023. With the new hires, we have filled all of our traditional Political Science faculty lines. We are excited to be able to offer our Latin American Politics course for the first time in over a decade this coming fall.

Political Science faculty were active researchers during the 2022-2023 academic year. They received four grants including one from the Unite America Institute for \$18,310, two from Research and Sponsored programs for ongoing research and one from CALS to bring an environmental policy speaker to campus. Members of the department had a combined five working papers in progress with plans to publish in the future. Two members of the department published work, a review in *The Journal of Election Administration, Research and Practice* and an article in *The Journal of Scholarship and Teaching*. Five members of the department gave presentations at conferences including the Midwest Political Science Association (National), the Southern Political Science Association and the American Political Science Association (National). An additional faculty member gave invited talks at three universities in India. One faculty member served as a consultant for FairVote. The faculty's research covered a wide range of important political science topics including ranked choice voting, direct democracy issues, migrant worker representation in Korea, content regulation, the Kenyan National Assembly, United States Foreign Policy, Democracy and the Criminal, and U.S. Education Policy.

Political Science Faculty were active on a number of key university committees including the College Curriculum Committee, the Academic Grievance Tribunal (Chair), Sub-School Personnel and Faculty Senate (Vice Chair). All members were active on the department committees including curriculum, personnel, and honors. The department was exceptionally busy this year as we completed a self study and campus visit for our department review.

Our students were successful this year too. One political science major served as president of student government, one received the chancellor's award and 16 were inducted into the political science honor society, Pi Sigma Alpha. Students were honored with political science awards for best paper, best portfolio, highest GPA in Political Science, Public Administration and Law and Justice at the campus honors convocation.

Curriculum

During the 2022-2023 academic year, there were no curriculum proposals initiated. The committee
met with faculty as needed to discuss the curriculum process and support those faculty interested

in developing future proposals. The committee provided feedback on potential transfer courses and course substitution requests as needed, and on proposed changes to PHY 105, PHY 106 and the CAP minor.

Sociology/Anthropology

The department had 14 full-time faculty during the 2022-2023 academic year, plus one visiting Assistant Professor: Joining us in the Fall 2022 semester were our two new faculty members, Miriam Barcus (Sociology) and Hollis Miller (Anthropology). Eight adjunct faculty were hired for the fall semester, though one (Scott Miller) resigned in October to take another position. Two faculty (Bittel and Pulsifer) took over Miller's sections. In total, 19 sections were taught by (part-time faculty, with the exception of Bittel taking over one of these). In the spring 2023 semester, seven part-time faculty taught 17 sections. Full- and part-time faculty in the Sociology-Anthropology Department taught 58 courses in the Fall 2022 semester, of which 38 were GE courses across eight categories (1, 3, 4, 6, 11, 12; eight of these were PS or WI). In the Spring 2023 semester 59 courses were taught, of which 34 satisfied the GE categories noted above, seven were Writing Intensive or Presentation Skills.

Department faculty continued their regular high level of productivity this year. Over the course of the year the following items were published (or accepted for publication): six peer-reviewed journal articles; five peer-reviewed book chapters; one book; two edited books; and one book review. In addition, one member (Miller) defended her dissertation and one member (Cannito-Coville) appeared on the "Violent Crime" expert panel in the program Connect NY, WCNY PBS (8/2022). Faculty delivered twenty-five conference presentations (outside of SUNY Cortland) at national and international venues. In addition to contribution to departmental committee work, faculty contributed service to eleven all-university service committees and three community/regional service areas (including to the Cortland Sherriff's Department [Johnson], New York State Water Resources Institute [Applin], and program review for SUNY Oswego [Johnson).

Seven Anthropology/Archaeology majors: Ryan Baumgartner, Kathryn Cosman, Demitri DeLeon, Deanna Gilman, Darren Heigel, Kaitlyn Hoitt, and Jennifer Kelly presented at the 2023 Transformations Conference. Sociology major Emily Fedrizzi and Archaeology major Madison Hanford completed a research pilot on professional success in academia with Dr. Liang. Alum Kasey Jacob ('20) was awarded a Fulbright Research Fellowship for research in India (commencing September 2023). Alum Holly Taylor ('21) published a peer-reviewed article (with Dr. Curtis) in the *Journal for Undergraduate Research*.

Enrollment

A total of 306 students were enrolled in our four degree programs as of September 2022, down from 346 in Fall 2021 and 414 in Fall 2020. The number of ANT/ARC majors has remained steady (and actually have increased); it is primarily a precipitous drop in the number of Sociology majors that has depleted our enrollments. In Spring 2023 we had 301 enrolled, which means that the number of incoming new transfers and outgoing graduated students was nearly the same. The number of incoming students for the fall 2023 semester is currently 97, which is 30 more than last fall. This will certainly raise our general numbers going forward. The drop in our enrollment has not impacted our class enrollments. As of the writing of this report, over 90% of our Fall 2023 sections are full or nearly so, with only a handful having 10 or more seats still available. According to the Faculty Workload Summary data, Sociology/Anthropology was, as of Fall 2022, the third largest Arts and Sciences Department by student enrollment (n=308) behind Economics (n=461) and just ahead of Psychology (n=352). We expect new majors across our department this fall which will keep us in this position or push us back to second after Economics. According to the Fall 2022 data regarding total student credit hours, Sociology/Anthropology had the second highest number (n=5783) behind English (n=6776). Our extensive GE service to the university means that we fall to sixth (within Arts and Sciences) in the number of student credit hours taught by FT faculty. However, in the analysis of upper division credit hours, which are almost exclusively taught by FT faculty, we are second (n=2228) behind Psychology (n=2393). This means that once students enter our major, even if their introductory course was taught by a part-time faculty member, it is likely that 100% of their additional major courses will be taught by a FT faculty member (or a VAP).

A total of 88 degrees were awarded to our students in 2022-2023. B.A. degrees were awarded to nine Anthropology majors, 45 Criminology majors, and 34 Sociology majors. The department's internship

program, coordinated by Elizabeth Bittel, placed 18 students in agencies during fall 2022 and 22 during the spring 2023 semesters. Two students are currently carrying out summer internships.

Curriculum

Major revisions to the Anthropology and Archaeology programs were submitted and approved this year, including changing our numbering system, introducing new classes, and revamping our Archaeology minor. We also deleted the concentrations within the Archaeology major, making the program a more streamlined experience for our majors. Our Criminology major was heavily revamped in 2021. We are assessing the success of these changes and will work toward further revisions as needed. After extensive discussion last year, we decided to eliminate the Social Gerontology concentration and its associated classes. New sociology classes were added to the curriculum, and several were renamed or slightly altered to better fit current trends in the field. Discussion continues regarding an applied sociology concentration. Major revisions to the main Sociology major are planned for the upcoming year.

H. Associate Dean 's Report

Each year the office of the Associate Dean has to address a wide variety of issues raised by students and faculty; most of them resolved to everyone's satisfaction. This year we continued that trend: we processed hundreds of withdrawals, course substitutions, graduation checklists, readmission applications, leave of absence requests, withdrawal from college requests, internship applications, study abroad petitions, and change of grade forms. The typical week in this office includes student appointments covering many topics: probation status, foreign language substitution, fellowship opportunities, student teaching eligibility, grade disputes, late registration requests, and attendance problems. In addition, there are numerous committee meetings, "drop-in" appointments and various other opportunities for practicing our problem-solving skills.

The major time commitment in this office is devoted to meetings; committee meetings are inevitable and often have ancillary obligations. More important to the mission of the office is the commitment to student meetings. Looking at the Associate Dean's calendar, we can roughly measure the number of students seen. From August 2022 to May 2023, we found the following data: about 370 probation meetings and 300 other meetings with students. For each student on probation, meetings occur every 3-5 weeks per semester. These numbers do not take into account student "walk-ins", urgent consultations with faculty, parent phone calls, advice via email, etc. We invest a significant amount of energy in reviewing graduation checklists and following up in those cases where the student's status is murky but graduation is possible. We also work with returning students who have been away for several years and are interested in what they need to graduate with a Cortland degree. Meeting with students, listening to their concerns and advising them on how best to proceed is the most vital component of our work.

Everything in the Associate Dean's Office depends greatly on the dedication, skill and patience of Michele Lella. In her routine work, Michele is quick to help students in need, and assists them in finding the right policies, offices to visit, next steps, etc. She keeps a friendly disposition when talking to students and parents, and she is consistently careful in dealing with our critical letters at the end of the semester (suspensions, etc.). She handles stressful periods (and stressed out students) with great poise. Most importantly, she has kept the Associate Dean and the Assistant Dean on task. In addition, she often covers for departments without an administrative assistant and assisted Modern Languages this Spring and Summer. She has earned exceptional performance evaluations.

Other Responsibilities:

<u>IDP majors</u> – There were no graduating IDP majors this year but several inquiries by students.

<u>Fellowships</u> — As the campus fellowship advisor I meet regularly with students who are interested in fellowships. Two students applied for the Fulbright award and both were successful! One applied for an ETA position in Spain and the other for a research position in India. One student applied for a Goldwater Scholarship and was unsuccessful.
