

Funding your education

Cost is an important consideration when planning a study abroad experience. Most full-time international students pursuing a SUNY Cortland degree receive a financial award worth \$7,500 per year, making our tuition among the most affordable for four-year campuses in the State University of New York system.

PARTNER INSTITUTION PERKS

→ Exchange and visiting students coming for one or two semesters may be eligible for a tuition waiver through partnership agreements with their home institutions.

INCOME OPPORTUNITIES

→ You're eligible to work on campus up to 20 hours each week for academic departments, administrative offices, recreation facilities or our dining services provider.

COST-FREE LIVING

→ If you study at SUNY Cortland for more than one year, you can apply to be a resident assistant, which offers free on-campus housing and a stipend in exchange for your service.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS**

→ Students pursuing a master's degree can work on campus and earn up to six credit hours per semester in tuition support. Positions vary in their time commitment and pay, with yearly stipends offering between \$7,000 and \$8,050. Assistantship opportunities can change based on annual budgets.

Sarah also joined a special program known as Cortland Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation (LSAMP), which introduces underrepresented students to science-related disciplines. She traveled to the Adirondack Mountains with students and professors from her major. She also attended a summer research symposium, which helped provide a new perspective on her career path.

Outside of her classes, Sarah enjoys traveling with friends and time spent with the Tae Kwon Do Club. She recommends attending campus events or joining clubs as the best ways to make new friends.

ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS

REAL-WORLD RELEVANCE

→ Courses involve a combination of lecture and discussion, with common assignments including tests, research papers and lab reports. Offices such as Advisement and Transition, The Learning Center and Career Services can help you succeed at Cortland and beyond.

DIVERSE PROGRAMS

→ Choose a major with guidance from your academic advisor. Popular programs include business economics, sport management, exercise science, international studies, biology and teaching English as a second language (non-certification track).

AN EASY TRANSITION

→ Undergraduates can join the international student seminar, a class that helps ease your transition to campus. You also can practice English through language courses or a conversation partner program.

HOW TO APPLY

Applying is a two-stage process.

- **1.** Your previous academic background is reviewed to determine if you are academically qualified.
- **2.** Once you are admitted, an international student advisor will work with you to determine if you meet the qualifications to receive Form 1-20 for an F-1 student visa or your DS-2019 for a J-1 student visa.

Passports and visas

International students must be in a valid immigration status for full-time study. The most common type of student visas are the F-1 and J-1 non-immigrant types. Most international students at SUNY Cortland come to the U.S. in F-1 status. If you intend to pursue full-time study in the U.S., please do not enter on the B-2 visa. Contact the International Programs Office for complete information about required documentation.
