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
ORDER YOUR GRAD SASH

You must place the order using your cortland.edu email. **Orders must be placed by April 18 at midnight** and all sashes will be shipped to the International Programs Office for pick up the week of May 6.

What did you learn from studying abroad?

I learned how to be more independent but asked for help when I needed it. I learned how to be more open-minded and be aware and respectful of other people's perspectives and ideas.

What made you want to become a peer advisor?

The main reason why I wanted to become peer advisor was because I wanted to promote my experience in the hope that it encourages others to take the opportunity to study abroad. As a first-generation student, I didn't know anyone that had study abroad, nor did I know the process of study abroad. My goal was to encourage other first-generation students: show them how the process is, encourage them that it's possible to go abroad and answer any questions they might have.

SPRINTAX THERE'S STILL TIME!

A Successful Tax Season with Sprintax

A non-resident in the US is legally required to file a tax return if they received US income anytime during 2023. Even if the person didn't work or receive income in the US, they still need to file a Form 8843 with the IRS. Forms must be mailed to IRS by the **April 15, 2024** deadline. Our office has arranged access to Sprintax software to file your 2023 federal taxes.

The International Programs Office has hosted a tax workshop for students on March 19.

Sprintax will guide students through the tax preparation process, arrange the necessary documents and check if the person is due a tax refund.

HEALTHCARE IN THAILAND WITH DRS. THERESA CURTIS AND CHRISTA CHATFIELD

Cortland's new Healthcare in Thailand program is a one-of-a-kind program introducing students to all different areas of healthcare. Drs. Curtis and Chatfield originally began working together leading the Healthcare in Mexico program in Cuernavaca, Mexico, where students were exposed to healthcare in a developing country while being immersed in a Spanish speaking setting. This January 2025 is the first time they will be running a program in Thailand with the hopes of placing a greater emphasis on healthcare as part of the program.

Students will have the opportunity to shadow healthcare providers on their rotations and meet with medical and nursing students to talk about the healthcare system in Thailand and learn about the different aspects of medical care. Students will also have the opportunity to visit with a monk and do a meditation, go to a dog sanctuary, and engage in service learning. All these activities introduce students to both the culture of Thailand and aspects of healthcare outside of the traditional system. Outside of their healthcare education, students will have dinner with a Thai family, visit a rice field and learn about rice planting, experience a night bazaar, a temple, and the infamous Bua Tong sticky waterfalls. Students earn three credits in biology for the course and will complete a weekly journal and a 3-5 page reflective essay comparing and contrasting healthcare in Thailand and the U.S.

Dr. Curtis believes studying abroad is important because it expands your mind: "Everyone has preconceived ideas about other places until you go these places and really experience another culture." She highlighted the special importance of this in terms of healthcare, where what students see on the surface is often not a full reflection of a country's healthcare management. Her hope is that students will broaden their horizons with the experience of traveling and studying abroad.

As with almost every other aspect of the transfer student experience, planning ahead for study abroad is vital to success. Transfer students are able to study abroad and are highly encouraged to do so. Credit obtained through a study abroad program counts as SUNY Cortland credit, even if you choose to study abroad through an Other-SUNY and doesn't count toward your transfer credit maximum. Transfer students are able to study abroad as early as their second semester at SUNY Cortland. We offer a variety of programs with durations ranging from 10 days abroad to a full-academic year. Programs are offered in the traditional fall and spring academic semesters, but also over winter break and the summer. This flexibility offers a wealth of opportunities for our students. The International Programs Office is here to help you select a program that makes sense for you.
