

Transfer Planning Sheet International Studies (IST)

The following Cortland courses are recommended by the department to complete prior to transfer. The transfer credit limit from a 2-year college is 64 credits. All classes are three (3) credits unless otherwise noted. [SUNY Transfer Path](#) courses are underlined and notated in blue.

Students in IST need to demonstrate foreign language proficiency beyond the regular College requirement. You can choose to complete a foreign language sequence to the intermediate level II (202) in a second language, complete 12 credits of courses at the 300 level or above in the initial language, study abroad, or by advisement.

Electives/Pre-requisites for upper-division courses (15 credits):

Depending on the concentration chosen, the pre-requisites needed will vary. You are encouraged to review the Catalog for details on the concentration you are interested in. However, the following are recommended:

4. ANT 102 Cultural Anthropology (will also fulfill GE 3 Social Science)

Applying to Cortland

- If you apply to Cortland using the SUNY application, SUNY will waive the \$50 application fee for transfer students graduating with an associate degree from a SUNY or CUNY college, who apply directly to Cortland for baccalaureate programs.
- Fall applicants should apply by March 1. Spring applications should apply by November 1.
