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My topic is on the various ways that students at SUNY Cortland can get involved on-campus. For example, joining a sport, club, Greek life, getting a job, going to on-campus events, etc. The possibilities of becoming more involved in the red dragon community are plentiful.

## Purpose of The Lesson:

I chose to talk about this topic with students because I remember being a first-year students at SUNY Cortland, unsure of all the opportunities our campus offers as a way to be an active participate.

Additionally, my lesson plan topic crossed over with two different assignments we had for our COR 101 section: The event requirement and on-campus scavenger hunt. I was able to guide students in the direction of how to complete the event requirement by discussing common events we have on-campus, which is a way of getting involved. While I did introduce ways of getting involved on campus, a first-year student may be unsure of where all of these are. This led into the scavenger hunt assignment where students would be able to find out more about these resources, as well as their exact location on campus.

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#### Intramurals:

There are two different types of Intramural Sports Programs: Intramural Leagues and Single-Day Tournaments. Intramural Leagues generally run for about 5 weeks of play, followed in most cases by a single elimination tournament. Teams are usually scheduled for 1 game per week. Most of these activities are offered at two levels: (1) All-School (highly competitive) and (2) Recreational (just for fun). Typical leagues that are offered include: flag football, soccer, basketball, volleyball, and broomball.

 One Day Tournaments/Special Events are designed for individuals who want to participate, but maybe cannot commit to an intramural league.
