Strategy	Reader Behaviors
Connecting	<ul> <li>Making connections to prior knowledge</li> <li>Making text-to-text connections</li> <li>Making text-to-self connections (personal experiences)</li> <li>Making text-to-world connections (generalized experiences)</li> </ul>
Inferencing	<ul> <li>Drawing on information from the text and background knowledge to understand what the text is about</li> <li>Filling in details missing from the text</li> <li>Elaborating on what is discussed in the text</li> </ul>
Monitoring	<ul> <li>Confirming or clarifying understanding of what is in the text</li> <li>Looking up and defining words used in the text</li> <li>Restating what is in the text</li> </ul>
Questioning	<ul> <li>Asking questions of the text</li> <li>Asking questions that extend the text</li> </ul>
Summarizing	<ul> <li>Restating key ideas from some unit of text (e.g., chapter, page, section)</li> <li>Determining what is most important to remember in a unit of text</li> </ul>
Synthesizing	<ul> <li>Connection to multiple earlier points in a text</li> <li>Making connections between multiple sources</li> </ul>
Criticality	<ul> <li>Reflecting on their own practices and behaviors</li> <li>Providing personal or research-supported counter-narratives</li> <li>Considering multiple and contradictory perspectives</li> <li>Asking questions about common social assumptions</li> <li>Seeing the everyday through new lenses</li> </ul>
Community	<ul> <li>Asking questions of a peer or peers</li> <li>Restating something another peer said</li> <li>Agreeing with something said by peer or peers</li> <li>Adding to or augmenting a by a peer's thinking</li> <li>Challenging ideas shared by a peer or peers</li> </ul>
