The Institute for Civic Engagement is getting a capacity-building boost with the addition of nine interns, each of whom will focus on one of four projects. Interns will collaborate in ways that develop professional skills while advancing SUNY Cortland's priorities.

One project is the new campus food bank: The SUNY Cortland Cupboard. Kaley Decker, a senior majoring in Business Economics, is the Student Coordinator on the Cupboard's Board of Directors. She ensures that the Cupboard is stocked, organized, accommodating, and publicized.

Decker acquired experience in managing budgets as treasurer of her sorority, Alpha Sigma Alpha. She earned additional organizational experience when she served as a Student Activity Board representative with the Student Government Association.

A second initiative is the Regional Voter Education Project. Austen Johnson, Ryann Hudson, and Patrick Schetter will co-develop this three-campus plan.

Johnson is a junior majoring in Political Science; he served as president of his residence hall during spring 2017.

Hudson is a sophomore majoring in both Political Science and Communications Studies.

Schetter, a senior majoring in Sociology with a minor in History, has worked as a counselor for children at baseball camp for many years; he currently serves as the SUNY Cortland Baseball Team's captain.

Schetter, Hudson, and Johnson will help the project meet its goal of helping people become more engaged in civic decision-making by developing skills for civil and informed discussion.

To help publicize these and other projects, Shannon Hanmer and Nicole Powers have teamed-up to serve as Publicity interns. Both interns will compose articles for the Institute’s newsletter, and they will interview people for the “Humans of Engagement” series. They will also photograph students engaged in applied learning projects.

Hanmer is a senior majoring in Professional Writing and Art. She works for ASC’s Bistro; she previously worked as an administrative assistant in an environmental firm.

Powers is also a senior majoring in Professional Writing; she is minoring in Sociology, and has studied abroad in Fulda, Germany.

Mariah Asencio, Lindsay Dieumegard, and Kayleen Driscoll will develop and conduct presentations through the fourth project: Promotions. They will promote applied learning at Open Houses, SGA club meetings, academic class meetings, and at other campus and community events.

They will also develop and conduct in-class participatory activities, such as the socio-economic docudrama, which is a way of building awareness of, and empathy for, people in different life situations.

Asencio is a senior majoring in Communications with a minor in management. She has developed extensive skills in recruiting volunteers, coordinating events, and managing public relations and social media as a member of Delta Phi Epsilon.

Dieumgard is a junior with a double major in Business Economics and Communications, with a concentration in Human Resources. She recently shadowed staff of the Development and Fundraising Department at Good Samaritan Hospital, where she learned about office management and fund raising.

Driscoll received her Associate’s Degree from Onondaga Community College in 2015 and is currently a senior majoring in Communications. She has worked in retail and has a good deal of experience in interpersonal communications. She has also worked as a child care assistant at the Syracuse YMCA.

Promoting Education on Issues and on Civil Discourse

Are you looking to take action to change political and community issues? Do you feel like you don't have a voice in your political community? Curious if your community can respectfully come together despite opposing beliefs? The Regional Voter Education Project (RVEP) is designed to create campus and community-wide cultures of civil and informed civic decision-making.

It is also poised to increase the number and percentage of people who register to – and actually do – vote. The goal is to increase students' feeling of political engagement and empowerment.

To reach this goal, the RVEP has established a solid objective: to supply the information and tools that enable people to assess political information and discuss potentially contentious topics even if they have opposing viewpoints. The program will create an environment where people with dissimilar political opinions can respectfully acknowledge and understand one another.

The RVEP will provide a platform to transform the *desire* for change into *action*.

How can we decide on issues? How can we generate good information? How can we develop a more understanding and respectful political community on and off campus? What can we do to motivate active civic engagement? These are the types of questions that the Regional Voter Education Project aspires to answer.

The Regional Voter Education Project will feature educational and participatory events during the semester. One such event will help

people with opposing viewpoints develop mutual respect by helping them find common ground.

Another kind of event, the Deliberative Dialog, uses trained facilitators to help participants identify common values as they discuss controversial issues.

In addition, the project will feature speakers, panel discussions and debates where participants can learn about important issues to consider in the November 2018 midterm elections.

There will be discussions on how the state and national legislatures work, as well as the steps you can take to be more politically-engaged. Another goal of the project is to convince students that each and every vote counts!

The group behind the Regional Voter Education Project stretches from SUNY Cortland to TC3 and Cornell University.

Members include interns Ryann Hudson, Austen Johnson, and Pat Schetter; Daniel Chamberlain (Cornell U. student), Cynthia Guy (Community Outreach Coordinator, Institute for Civic Engagement), Christopher Kuretich (Assistant VP for Student Affairs), Elisabeth Lareau (NYPIRG Program Coordinator), Ezra Lencer (NY23Votes), Ayesha Mazhar (Biological Sciences major and Fulbright Scholar), TC3 Professors Kerry Curran (English) and Kelly Wessell (Chair, Environmental Studies Program), and John Suarez (director, Institute for Civic Engagement).

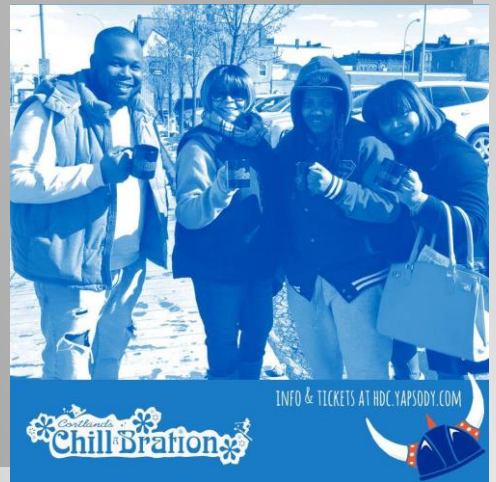
