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

The event – “Cortland Bandstand” – is part of SUNY Cortland's *National Voter Registration Day* events. It is a collaboration between on-campus clubs and the Institute for Civic Engagement. Event organizers plan to register as many eligible individuals as possible.

During the concert, performers will encourage listeners to register to vote. Trained volunteers will help students properly complete the paperwork.

Two Lectures Planned to Honor Constitution Day

On September 18, Distinguished Service Professor Robert Spitzer will discuss the legal and political bases of impeachment, how it has operated in the past, and how it might or might not apply to the Trump presidency. Spitzer's lecture will be in Corey Union's Exhibition Lounge at 4:30 pm.

Both presentations will feature a question and answer session, and they are free and open to the public.


SUNY Cortland students will have an opportunity to help victims of Hurricane Harvey by walking laps in Lusk Field House during a “Hustle for Houston” fundraiser sponsored by the College’s Student Government Association.

The event will take place between 1 and 4 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 1.

Money raised will be donated to organizations involved in rescue and recovery efforts related to what scientists are calling the worst rainfall disaster in United States history.

"Everyone is watching this on TV, and as much as I wanted to help, I knew everyone on campus would want the opportunity to step up and help the victims of Hurricane Harvey," said SGA President Aristotle Arkayasa.

Members of the SUNY Cortland Community can participate by soliciting donations or donating themselves, either individually or as teams.



SGA will track team donations, and expects Red Dragon competitive spirit will provide an extra incentive for giving.

Applied Learning Coalition

The Institute’s director, John Suarez, partnered with Linda Drake, director of SUNY Oneonta’s Center for Social Responsibility and Community, to form a new professional organization: The North/South Central NY Applied Learning Coalition.

The Coalition is designed to be an informal and agile mutual-assistance organization. It has 32 members who represent 22 public and private institutions of higher education, from Canton to Binghamton to Stony Brook.

New York Campus Compact’s Executive Director, Laurie Worrall, created a listserv and Google Forum for the Coalition. Merissa McKasty, assistant to SUNY’s Director of Applied Learning, scheduled time and space for the Coalition’s second meeting at SUNY’s Applied Learning Conference in October.

Of Interest–More than 2,600 service-learning students devote about 184,000 hours of service– worth over \$5 million to the community annually.

Campus Food Pantry Update

Last February a team of students, faculty, staff and alumni, came together to start planning a food pantry for food insecure students.

This semester, the team is moving forward with choosing a location for the pantry.

Although a specific place has not been chosen yet, the team has toured two on-campus options and plan to reach a final decision soon.

Alex Cicero, the student coordinator for the project, says that she is excited to tackle the task of beginning a pantry.

“I’ve worked on hunger and homelessness issues with NYPIRG before, but the food pantry will be something different – something that is prolonged and concrete once we get it running. Getting it started is a lot of administrative work, and is different from what I’ve done before,” Cicero said.

With rising costs of higher education, students often struggle to afford food.

According to The Atlantic, two thirds of community-college students do not have enough to eat.

While on-campus students are required to purchase an unlimited meal plan, off-campus students can choose not to have a meal plan. Furthermore, President



Bitterbaum disclosed that, last year, about 300 SUNY Cortland students came from families who have an annual income of \$5,000 or less.

This financial strain can cause extreme hardship for students off-campus who need to purchase food.

When choosing a location for the pantry, the team considered issues of privacy, accessibility and safety.

Team members include students (including SGA members), Student Affairs, NYPIRG, Health Department faculty, Alumni board members, Campus Ministries, the Cortland College Foundation, Financial Aid, Counseling and Student Development, Facilities and Management, and the Institute for Civic Engagement.
